

D. K. Walterhouse Polio Victim Dies in Japan

State Department Consular Aid

LADOGA, Aug. 2.—Services for David K. Walterhouse, who died of polio July 8 in Osaka, Japan, are to be arranged when the body arrives in this country. He was scheduled to arrive at San Francisco Sunday.

Mr. Walterhouse, who was 35, was employed in the Consular Service of the U. S. State Department in Osaka. He served in the information and education department. He had been ill two weeks.

He joined the Army Air Corps in 1942, serving in this country, then in the occupation forces in Japan after the war. He was discharged there early in 1947 and joined the State Department.

A native of Oakville, he was graduated from Ladoga High School and attended Antioch College, Yellow Springs, O. He worked at L. S. Ayres & Co.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. H. K. Walterhouse, Ladoga; a sister, Mrs. Walter Hawley, and two nephews, John and David Hawley, all of Indianapolis; three aunts, Miss Lydia Hosetter, Ladoga; Mrs. Robert Douglas and Mrs. Marian Stewart, both of Tampa, Fla., and an uncle, John T. Walterhouse, Muncie.

Find No Foul Play In Woman's Death

Laboratory Analysis To Follow Autopsy

Part of the mystery surrounding the death of a former beauty shop operator was cleared today when an autopsy revealed "no evidence of foul play."

However, police said the autopsy by Dr. Philip Henessee failed to reveal the cause of death of 52-year-old Mrs. Florence E. Smith, 1426 Spann Ave. Contents of the dead woman's stomach will be taken to the Indiana University Medical Center for laboratory analysis.

Police said results of the analysis will not be known for at least three days.

Dead in Bed

Mrs. Smith was found dead in her bed yesterday. Police homicide investigators were called because the apartment was upset and bloodstained toilet tissue littered the room.

A divorcee, Mrs. Smith operated a beauty parlor on 34th St. between Pennsylvania St. and Washington Blvd. until two months ago.

Services for Mrs. Smith will be held at 2:30 p. m. Friday in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. Burial will be in Crown Hill.

A daughter, Miss Marilyn Smith, Chicago, is the only survivor.

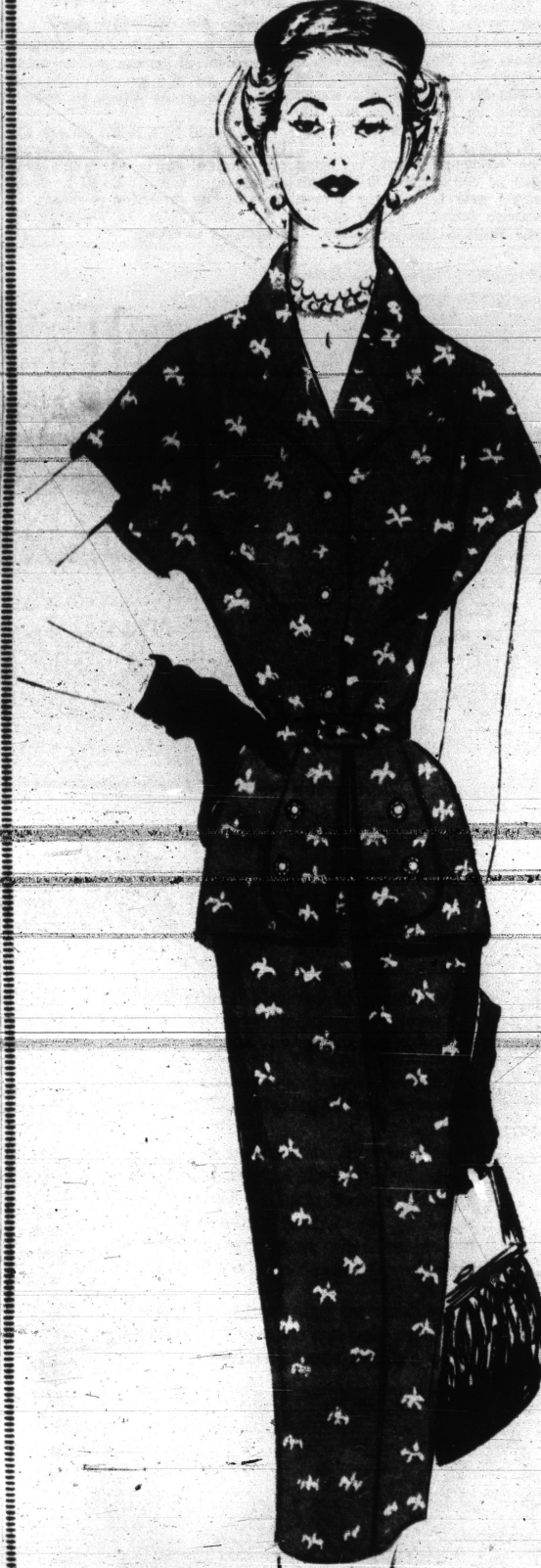
