

Elected State Aids Favor 4-Year Terms

Governor's 'Cabinet'
Supports Equal
Lengths of Service

Indiana's seven elected state officials all believe they should serve four-year terms. But, with one exception, they think they should be picked by the people and not appointed.

Because this is the "off-year" when four members of the Governor's six-man "cabinet" run for additional two-year terms, the United Press surveyed Statehouse opinion.

Gov. Schricker suggested that all be elected for the same four-year term the governor is chosen for, and said he thought "some day we'll get around to changing them."

Sheriffs' Shifted
A constitutional amendment was adopted in 1948, changing the sheriffs' terms to four years, and a similar amendment covering county treasurers, coroners and surveyors passed the 1949 General Assembly. It must also pass the 1951 Legislature and be ratified by the voters. Meanwhile, it acts as a bar to any other amendments.

Gov. Schricker also suggested it might be a good idea to take the superintendent of public instruction out of politics by having the State Board of Education appoint him.

The present superintendent, Deane E. Walker of Culver, agreed.

Wilcox in Accord
"We ought to elect all state officials for four-year terms," said Mr. Walker, "and surely in the field of education. It might be a good idea to have the superintendent appointed by the Governor or by the Board of Education."

Treasurer F. Shirley Wilcox, New Albany, was in favor of electing for four years, and starting the terms with the Governor's, instead of staggering the starts from December to March.

"As it is, you barely get settled in a job," Mr. Wilcox said, "start what you hope is a constructive program, and then you have to take six months out to campaign for reelection, or else you can't hope to complete it."

OK'd by McManamon

Attorney General J. Emmett McManamon, Indianapolis, the only four-year man in addition to the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, believed in four-year terms "to assure the governor of a complete 'cabinet' to conduct the affairs of state and assist him."

Mr. McManamon, whose office was appointive until 1941, was strongly against making the offices appointive. He said he thought it was a good idea to get several different points of view in the Statehouse, which would be impossible if the Governor named all minor officials.

Lt. Gov. John A. Watkins agreed with Secretary of State Charles F. Fleming and Auditor James M. Propst, who wanted four-year terms "so I can do a better job."

Filipinos Awaiting Korea War Order

20 Pct. of Force
Ready to Fight

MANILA, P. I., Sept. 1—One-fifth of this republic's Korean expeditionary force is ready.

It only awaits Gen. MacArthur's go-ahead before it sets sail for battle areas to fight beside other United Nations units against North Korean Communists.

But now that it's going to participate in the defense of South Korea, the Philippine government wants to do it in style. And while this "style" may seem little in wealthier countries, its cost for the Philippines is sizable.

It is planned to send a full regimental combat team of from 5000 to 6000. Military spokesmen estimate it'll cost no less than \$42.5 million to equip and maintain such a force in the field for a year.

Ready to Leave

Philippine troops in the first contingent, eager to go, number 1200 men and the remainder of the promised contribution are being handpicked by the Armed Forces of the Philippines under its chief, Maj. Gen. Mariano M. Castaneda.

A regular regimental team, according to AFP officials, consists of 4500 officers and men, but it will need full complement of replacements equivalent to 25 percent of its strength.

To equip these men initially costs \$17 million. This includes pay, food allotments for a year. Operation costs for a year of combat will amount to \$30 million.

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


