Outlines All-Out Mobilization Plans

Will Expand Combat And Production Draft

EAST CHICAGO, Oct. 5 (UP)—Plans to mobilize every Indiana man and woman between the ages of 14 and 65, in the event of an all-out war emergency, were discussed last night by Gen. Robinson Hitchcock.

Gen. Hitchcock, Indiana adjutant general and draft director for the state, said the general outline of the plan already has been developed.

The state's 89 local selective service boards would have to be expanded to 296 to register, classify and assign, he said, and they would be authorized to designate persons for war production and combat.

Military Phase Ready
The master plan calls for placement in all essential fields, industrial as well as military, Gen. Hitchcock said. The military phase of the program now is ready to be put into action, he said.

Gen. Hitchcock addressed a national newspaper week banquet sponsored by the Hammond, East Chicago and Whiting Elks Lodges.

Veterinarians Attend Sessions at Purdue

LAFAYETTE, Oct. 5—The importance of controlling diseases in animals to protect human beings was stressed here yesterday at the opening of the Purdue University short course for veterinarians.

Dr. L. E. Burney, of the Indiana State Board of Health, told more than 150 practicing Hoosier veterinarians that efforts to save cows from bovine tuberculosis have almost eliminated the disease in humans the last 30 years.

Schricker Gets Red Petition Case

Democrats Want Document Located

Gov. Schricker today had the case of the missing Communist petition dumped in his lap.

The Governor was dragged into the case by top Democrats, including Secretary of State Charles F. Fleming, who says his signature on the petition is "a forgery."

The Democrats want the Governor to aid them in locating the mysterious letter, missing from the files in his office. The letter was presented to former Gov. Gates in the summer of 1946 and asked him to put the Communist Party on the ballot.

Whether Gov. Schricker will allow himself to become entangled in the case is doubtful. He already has refused to allow a State Police handwriting report on Mr. Fleming's petition signature to be made public.

Strategy Outlined

With the top state Democratic command content to make the missing document "the big campaign issue," the policy-makers have decided on the following strategy:

A conference will be arranged between Ira Haymaker, state Democratic leader, and Gov. Schricker. Mr. Haymaker will attempt to show the Governor how important it is politically to attempt to find the missing document.

The remainder of the strategy consists of all Democratic candidates yelling loud and long of the "smear" tactics of the Republicans. In addition, the Democrats have attempted to get Prosecutor George Dailey to help make headlines with a Grand Jury investigation.

Waits for OK

Mr. Dailey, Democratic candidate for re-election, was quoted by top Democrats as saying "I'll be glad to push the deal if I get the go sign from the Governor."

Thus far, the Governor wasn't having any part of the case. He resisted all efforts to make the State Police "forgery" report public.

"I don't want the state to get mixed up in this," he was quoted as saying. Meanwhile, Prosecutor Dailey said the case was "not ready" to take before the Grand Jury. It is believed that he is waiting for word from the Governor to proceed.

Republicans and many Democrats close to the Governor's office say it will never come.

State Doctors Prepare For Possible War Call

Indiana's 4200 doctors prepared themselves for possible war duty today through 80 county committees set up to survey the medical profession's manpower.

Selective service spokesmen here said there was no indication when the doctor-draft machinery would start rolling but reports from Washington tentatively indicated the medical men would register Oct. 16.

Two Small Boys Held By Juvenile Authorities

Two small boys accused of setting a fire in a garage were in custody of Juvenile Aid authorities today.

The boys, aged 10 and 11, were taken into custody by police yesterday after a trash box was found blazing in the garage at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Heistand, 1124 Pleasant St.

The boys, found in the alley nearby, admitted stealing seven light bulbs from the garage and cutting electric light wires leading to the building, police said.
