Bishop Moore Speaks
Bishop Arthur J. Moore, always heralded as a fine orator and authority on foreign missions, gave the main address. Bishop Moore spoke on "Methodism in a Bewildered World."

The DePauw University Choir, robed in maroon gowns and directed by Prof. George Gove, sang Negro spirituals.

Students enrolled on scholarships in Methodist colleges, who live in all parts of the world, were introduced. They gave an international flavor to the meeting. For they represented various races and nations and some were in native dress. They recalled that the Methodist banner flies in 50 different lands.

Kinsey N. Merritt, vice president of the Railway Express Agency, New York, spoke from the layman's viewpoint. Mr. Merritt besought the Methodists to make this an age of faith. "Let us so live that future generations will think of ours as the age of faith, not the atomic age. Let us make this a Christian America," he said.

Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas presided. Bishop Richard C. Raines of the Indiana area responded to Bishop Martin on behalf of local church folk.

Bishop Moore's address reflected his trip to Asia this year. He general's administration "superb, wise and a courageous leadership which has made the country a stout belief in the ultimate supremacy of righteousness."

Backs Negro Students

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Oct. 5 (UPI) — The Crimson-White, student newspaper at the University of Alabama, said in an editorial in this week's issue that it failed to see "what would be so terrible" about Negroes attending classes there.

"We southerners think nothing of riding the same busses or shopping in the same stores," the editorial said. "We doubt if the violent proponents of segregation leave the room when a Negro janitor comes in to sweep. We don't think students will have to leave the room when a Negro student comes in to learn."

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
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
