That could well be the epitaph of Patrick B. Sweeney, owner of Sweeney's Grocery, 1449 Columbia Ave., who died yesterday.

Mr. Sweeney was noted for his generosity and charity contributions around the neighborhood, helping several families get through the hard years of the depression.

A native of County Donegal, Ireland, he comes to Indianapolis as a young man and started his grocery business soon after.

Mr. Sweeney, who is the father of the Rev. Cornelius Sweeney, assistant pastor of SS Peter and Paul Cathedral, was stricken while changing a tire on his car on Broadway just south of 424 St. He died near his car soon afterward.
