

Investigate Death Of Woman, 80

Victim Stricken Trying To Aid Injured Kin

Local authorities today were investigating the cause of death of an 80-year-old woman stricken yesterday when she tried to help her nephew, who was hurt when he fell.

Mrs. Frances R. Halliday, 1562 Carrollton Ave., was pronounced dead at the scene. Her 65-year-old nephew, William E. Tennant, same address, was in fair condition at General Hospital with a possible fractured skull.

Woman Collapses

According to a neighbor girl, Margaret Stevenson, 11, of 1558 Carrollton, Mr. Tennant either slipped or fainted. She said she saw Mrs. Halliday go to his aid, lean over him and collapse.

Mrs. Halliday's body was taken to the morgue.

Mrs. Halliday, who moved to Indianapolis 35 years ago, was a member of the Central Avenue Methodist Church and Daughters of the American Revolution. Her husband, Eustace, died five years ago.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

3 GREEK BANKS STRUCK

Reds Slow Up Yanks to Crawl

South Koreans Seize Key Airfield

the city occupied but not fully secured.

The Communists still were in hillside positions where they could and did—lob occasional artillery and mortar shells into the city.

Reds in Flight

However, most of the enemy defenders were fleeing west and southwest in the general direction of Pyongyang or northward toward Munchon, 10 miles away.

War prisoners claimed there was "a Russian unit" in Munchon, but authorities gave the story little credence.

Only above Kaesong were the Allies meeting determined resistance.

East of the Kaesong sector, the South Korean 8th Division reached Yonchon, 35 miles north of Seoul and six miles above the border against moderate to light resistance.

Red Units Fighting
The South Korean 8th Division, still farther to the east, pushed six miles north from the former enemy strong point of Hwachon and captured Nodong, 13 miles above the frontier.

Skirmishes against by-passed Communist troops continued in southern Korea. The Communists were fighting in groups of from 100 to 400 and were being systematically wiped out or captured.

It was estimated the Reds now have lost 226,500 troops in dead, wounded or missing. Of these, 56,500 were captured.

Fighter bombers of the 5th Air Force devoted most of their attention Tuesday to ground support for South Korean forces around Wonsan. They inflicted 300 casualties and destroyed or damaged eight tanks.

him one mother reported she frequently caught him exposing himself in front of the children.

In another room Lt. Higgs found a lipstick-smearing woman, still in bed at noon with all of her clothes on. A 2-month-old baby and a child about 2 were on the bed with their bottles. An older boy was playing on the littered floor. Stacks of dishes covered with garbage stood on the table.

Wife of GI

The woman said she was the wife of a Camp Atterbury soldier and that she moved here a week ago.

"I'll give you 15 minutes to get started cleaning this place and your kids," Lt. Higgs told her. She left to go to a neighbor's to borrow soap.

While police stood in the corridor an elderly man weaved in the door and stopped to pat a little girl about 3 years old on the head before he started unsteadily up to his room. One policeman said he recognized the man as a suspected sexual degenerate.

'Sheaf of Complaints'
A JAD officer carried a sheaf of complaints and police reports on trouble in the hotel. One came from a woman who reported she saw the man next door taking liberties with his 9-year-old daughter who was mentally deficient.

The woman who was the complainant said she planned to marry the man as soon as her divorce was final.

There were other reports, dating back two years. One was a father who locked his children alone in the room without food while he went out to drink. Another was a mother who kept her oldest boy out of school to watch three others, while she went out to drink and bring men home to her one-room apartment. Still another on a drunk who stayed in the hotel, molesting the children.

JAD officials also said they have received reports that children come to school too sleepy to work after sleeping 8 to 10 in one bed. Others have to be washed and "de-loused" before being allowed to go into classrooms.

There was a sign in the entrance to the corridor where most of the families with children live, saying: "As a courtesy to those who like to sleep, children will not be allowed to play in the hall after 9 p. m."

Lt. Higgs dispatched two women workers to take detailed reports of every room where children were kept in filth and squalor. He also talked to several mothers who had made visible attempts to keep the squalid rooms clean and advised them to get their children out of the hotel.

A conference between JAD, fire, health and building officials was scheduled to follow the raid, preliminary to a concerted move to close the hotel. The owner, identified as A. J. Schloemer of Monticello on fire inspection reports, was not present in the hotel.

Asks Dump Operators For Schedule of Fees
The city sanitation department today called on private operators of city dumps to submit a schedule of dumping fees for study.

The sanitation board made the request after receiving reports that many Indianapolis persons have been overcharged for dumping. This, board members reasoned, forced many people to dump refuse on highways and county roads to escape the charges.

Under leases signed by the sanitation board and private operators the board has the authority to restrict rates at "reasonable" levels.

want to form a combination religious and patriotic group."

Dr. Carrick declined to reveal the exact number of followers in his organization but he said "there are thousands and thousands of people who believe in our principles."

"I abhor the word Democracy," Dr. Carrick said. "This country was founded as a Republic and we should go back to our original form. I am very patriotic and I want to get others that way."

In a letter to Secretary of State Fleming, Dr. Carrick wrote: "We want this charter because we want a safer and a better America and we want the right to live in peace."

Dr. Carrick said the charter was to be used as a "moral and spiritual" force to "advocate theocratic principles in government, if you happen to know what the word means."

Accuse Secretary of State
(Webster's Dictionary defines theocracy as government or political rule by clergy as representatives of God.)

In his letter, Dr. Carrick accused the Secretary of State of giving charters to "pink" and "Red" organizations for the last 20 years.

In addition to Dr. Carrick, four others signed the application for the charter. Listed as directors, they were: Dr. Carl D. Hill, 1115 W. 29th St.; Betty Jane Alton, 2702 Sutherland Ave.; Eric Carrick, 506 W. 31st St.; Charles B. Riley, 523 E. New York St.

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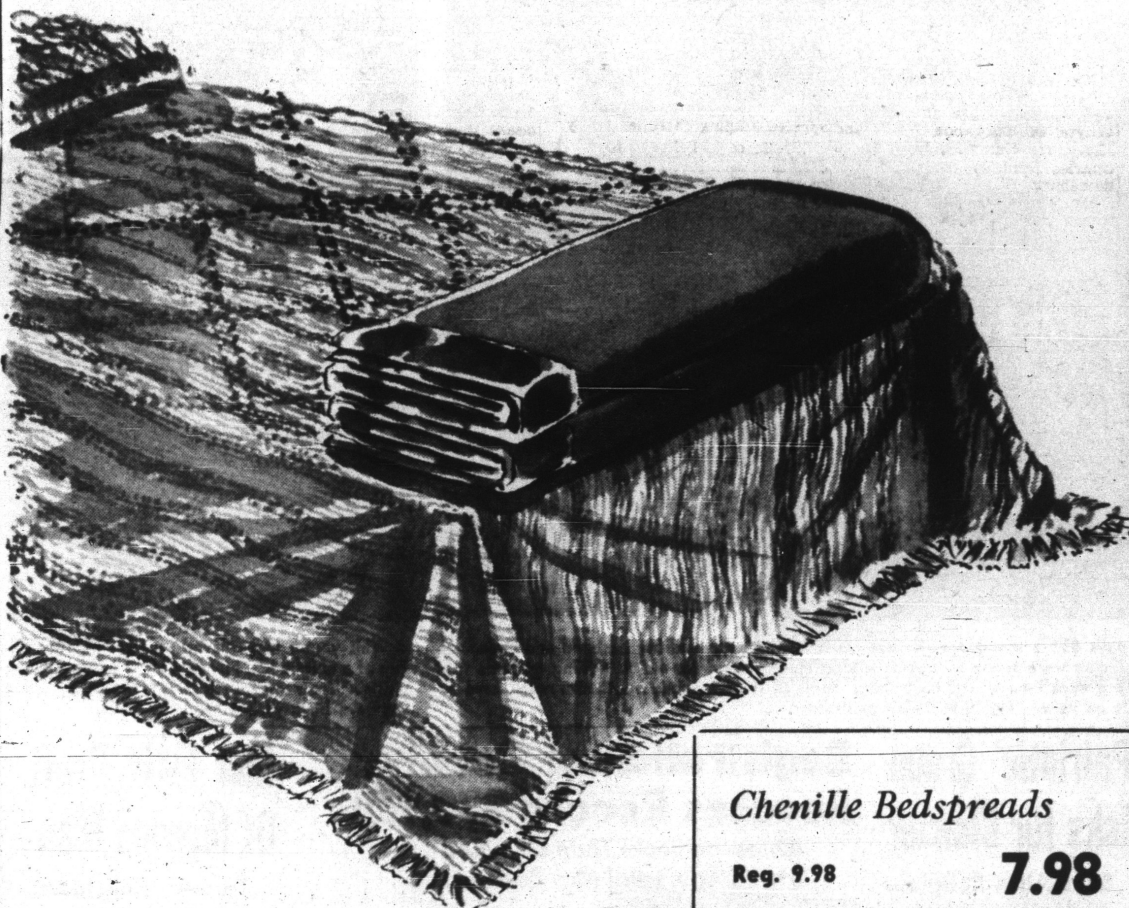
ARMY EMPLOYEE ENDS LIFE

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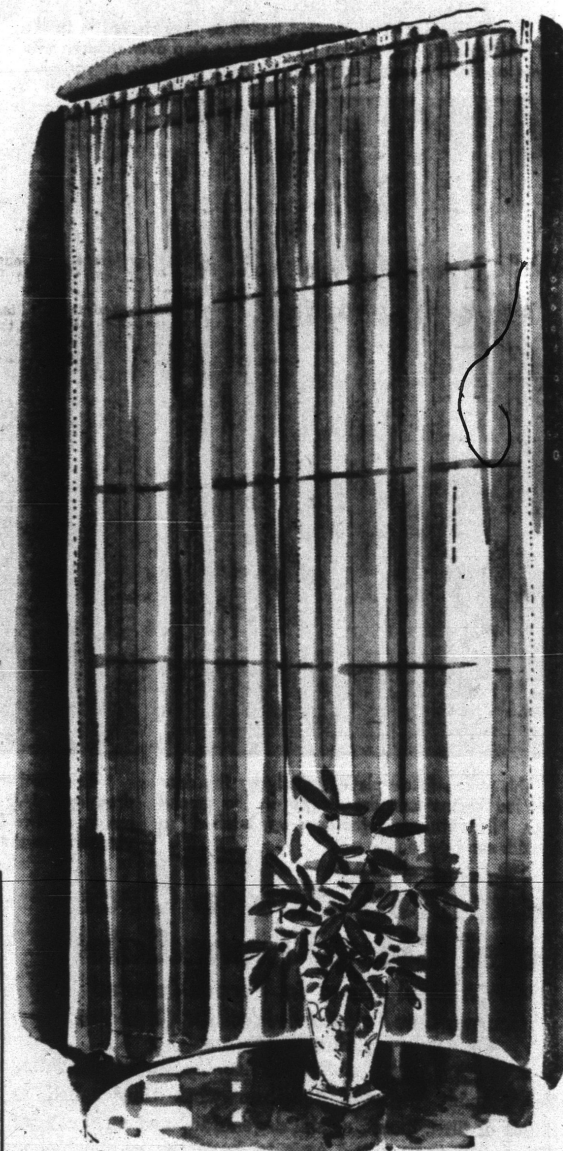
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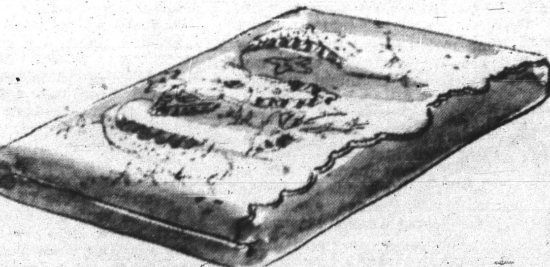
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
