

Missionaries To Address EUB Meeting

Session Tonight At Brookside Church

Missionaries from many countries will give addresses at the Youth Rally of the Quadriennial Convention of the Evangelical United Brethren Women's Society of World Service here tonight.

The convention opened Thursday night in the Brookside Church. It will continue with events of major importance featuring bishops of the church and other celebrities through Monday noon.

The Indiana Central College A capella Choir directed by Allan Schirmer will sing at the session at 7:30 tonight in the church. Missionaries from the Philippines, Switzerland, Africa, Japan, Germany and the United States will speak on "My Purpose: To Declare His Glory." Fannie Kolke will give the prayer and Miss Flora Argia will play a piano solo. Both are students from Japan.

Missionaries and guest ministers will preach in local pulpits tomorrow. Bishop George E. Epp, Naperville, Ill., episcopal leader of the Central Area, will preach at 10:45 a. m. in the host church. The bishop has announced the sermon title: "Thou' Wars Rise Up Against Me."

Dr. Carl Heinmiller, Dayton, O., executive secretary of the Department of World Missions, will speak on "Christ in the Orient" at the popular meeting tomorrow at 2:30 p. m. in the church.

An ecumenical procession led by trumpeters will highlight the meeting tomorrow at 7:30 p. m. Bishops, Women's Councils, ministers, interdenominational representatives, and others, all in special robes will march. The Witherspoon United Presbyterian Choir will sing and 10 young girls will present the flags of world mission fields and the United Nations' Flag.

Religious Group Helps Children's Character

Children will discover the adventure of religion if guided to do so by their teachers, Mrs. James Pontius maintains.

Mrs. Pontius, new director of religious education for the North Unitarian Church, is putting this theory into practice in the Sunday School. She is using the much heralded lessons furnished by the Union College Character Research Project and Dr. Ernest Ligon, director, Schenectady, N. Y.

"We strive to make age-old beliefs such as the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes practical for the child so that he may apply them immediately to every day life," Mrs. Pontius explained. "And we establish cooperation between the parents and the school in the doing."

Parents Report Results

All organizations using the Union College materials become a part of the Union College Research Project. Persons and organizations are enrolled from Maine to Washington State and even in London, England. Parents write down the effects they see in their children. And teachers record their observations of the children in the schools.

All reports go to Union College where they are sifted and, if possible, used. The lessons are constantly revised. Thus the work of Dr. Ligon's staff has gone on for years and continues.

Mrs. Pontius studied with Dr. Ligon and applied his methods as education director in the First Dutch Reformed Church, Schenectady, before coming here.

The Park School also is enrolled in the research project.

The Indianapolis YMCA is conducting the research experiment in connection with its new North District, Morrill Paine, who also studied with Dr. Ligon, is directing the North Side work. Merrill Underwood of the "Y" is in charge of a similar project in the Southport Grade School. And the "Y" reports it expects to reopen later the research conducted last year in School 72.

Artist Will Give Talk

Chalk Drawing To Be Made At Church

N. R. Swartwout of Chicago will give one of his chalk drawings with a surprise feature tomorrow at 8 p. m. in the Meridian Heights Presbyterian Church.

The drawing will be made with a musical background furnished by the host church choir under the direction of Richard Whittington. The program will open a series of Sunday evening musical offerings for the community given by Mr. Swartwout.

If their work is successful, it is assumed that the organ union will take place.

The chalk artist will use regular chalks, fluorescent chalks, color-filtered lights and black lights to achieve his completed picture. It will be titled: "The Shepherd at Twilight."

Mr. Swartwout really will draw two pictures simultaneously but the audience will be able to see only one as he proceeds. At the close, the black light will cause the second scene to glow brilliantly and the first to disappear.

The artist is business manager of Baker's Helper, a trade journal published in Chicago. He has given hundreds of chalk-talk musical programs throughout the country. Mr. Swartwout will accept no honorarium but performs free using his own intricate equipment of lights and the like. No collection will be taken at the meeting.
