A silver star medal was awarded posthumously today to Pvt. Robert E. Kopp according to a United Press release. Pvt. Kopp, 1423 N. Olney Ave., was killed in Korea on Aug. 12.

Mr. Kopp has not yet received official word concerning the award, but he thinks his son must have earned the medal in his last battle.

The regimental chaplain of the 9th Infantry wrote Mr. Kopp that "Pvt. Kopp met his death in the face of fierce enemy opposition in the move to force the North Korean Army back behind the Nakdong River."

A student of Technical High School, Pvt. Kopp worked at the H. P. Wasson & Co. before joining the service Aug. 1, 1949. He would have been 20 on Sept. 9.
