Speaks to Nation On Radio Tonight

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President's speech," one White House staff member said.

Mr. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota and now President of Pennsylvania University, called Gen. MacArthur "one of the greatest generals in all of history."

While Mr. Stassen's remarks were viewed in some quarters as a bid to strengthen the G.P., the President has insisted that his trip to meet Gen. MacArthur was non-political.

For example, Mr. Truman has scheduled no political appointments during his San Francisco visit. Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said word has been circulated to political candidates to keep their distance from the President.

Uneventful Flight
James Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for governor of California, will be at the opera house tonight to hear the President speak.

Mr. Truman landed here yesterday afternoon after an uneventful flight from Hawaii. He was tanned and rested after taking Sunday off to swim and loaf at one of Hawaii's beaches.

On his arrival, Mr. Truman was greeted by Vice President Alben Barkley and Mayor Elmer E. Robinson. Mr. Barkley is staying at the Fairmont Hotel, where the President was quartered.

It was the first time San Francisco ever entertained the President and Vice President of the United States at the same time.

Cheered on Way
The President climbed into an open limousine with Mr. Barkley and Mr. Robinson for a 20-mile ride to San Francisco. Along the way, enthusiastic crowds waved and cheered Mr. Truman, who waved and smiled back.

At the hotel, the President went to his room and immediately called Mrs. Truman in Washington. Then he ordered a steak dinner. He had one visitor, U. S. Appellate Court Judge Homer T. Bone, a former Democratic colleague of the President's in the U. S. Senate.

Later, the President and his top advisers, including Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, got down to work on the President's speech.

After his speech, the President will fly to Washington.

Revise Draft Status Of Married Men

A new directive from Selective Service Headquarters in Washington is going to change the draft status of a certain class of married men.

Men who marry after they receive notification of their induction physicals, are affected by the new clause.

Local draft boards will have the final word in such cases. Men marrying under such conditions ARE eligible for induction.

The nation was notified yesterday of the new draft clause in a directive from Lewis B. Hershey, National Selective Service director.

Prior to the new ruling, only men who were married after notification of induction were placed in similar positions, according to Mrs. Helen Mitchell, chief clerk at the County Selective Service Headquarters here.

"At that conference Gov. Hanley told me that he was withdrawing as a candidate for governor and urged me to run for reelection," Gov. Dewey said.

"He wanted to run again for lieutenant governor. I told him that I would not run again unless he ran for United States Senate."

Gov. Dewey next referred to a luncheon meeting with Mr. Hanley at Saratoga. At this meeting Mr. Hanley advised him that his financial problems were serious and he was fearful of the future.

"I told Gov. Hanley that the question was academic because he would be elected to the United States Senate," Gov. Dewey continued.

"He then asked about his job with the state, and I told him that the people of the state could not afford to lose his services. And that any time he had wanted an appointment to a state job he could always have had it. That has been a standing offer for a long time as you all know."

Charge by Lynch
Rep. Walter A. Lynch, Democratic candidate for governor, charged in Batavia, N. Y., last night that promises of a job and \$70,000 to pay his debts persuaded Mr. Hanley to junk his hopes of replacing Gov. Dewey and run for the Senate instead.
