Leaves soaked by dew and fog prevented one train from gaining traction as it headed up a grade. A second train was sent to push the first over the grade.

Gun Fails to Yield  
Clues in SlayingNo Motive Found  
In Spencer Killing

SPENCER, Oct. 21 (UP)—Deputy Sheriff Denzil Gentry said today police could find no fingerprints on a revolver which they believed was the gun used to kill Robert Hight shortly after midnight Wednesday.

The revolver was found yesterday about 150 feet from a bloodstained area of a cornfield where the murder victim's body was lying.

Mr. Hight, a 30-year-old farm leader, stepped outside his home Wednesday to investigate what he thought were prowlers. Soon afterwards, his grandmother heard "four or five shots" and Mr. Hight's call for help.

No motive has been established for the murder, Mr. Gentry said. Mr. Hight had no known enemies.

One bullet entered Mr. Hight's body, the deputy sheriff said, and death resulted from a severed artery.
