Climb Mountain For Crash Victims

Parents of 19 Among
58 Dead in Plane

CORPS. France, Nov. 15 (UPI)—Two hundred mountain climbers set out before dawn today to bring 58 mangled bodies from the wreckage of a Canadian airliner that smashed into 8700-foot Mont De L'Obiou.

There were no survivors in the crash Monday, the second major air disaster in the French Alps in a fortnight. Forty-eight persons were killed aboard an Air India constellation several days earlier.

The Monday crash victims were 57 Canadian pilgrims to a Catholic beatification ceremony in Rome and American Joseph Butera of Brooklyn, N. Y.

Among those aboard the Curtis-Reid airliner were Mr. and Mrs. Alphonse Michaud, who were chosen by the Catholic Church to visit Rome because they had a "model family" of 19 children.

Michaud, 55, and his 51-year-old wife received the blessing of Pope Plus XII on behalf of the citizens of Plessisville, Quebec.

Twelve of the Michaud children are under 10 years old. The youngest is 6.

"They still do not believe it," said their parish priest in Quebec. "They are too shocked to realize they no longer have a father and mother."

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Found Germans 'Cheerful'


