

From the Korean Beat— No Communists Can Be Found?

Reds Disappear Like Nazis,
Fascists in World War II

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA, Nov. 15 (CDN)—Noted while fishing with grenades:

Me a Communist? At war's end nothing but a lie detector could find a German or Jap who admitted supporting the Nazi or Nip militarists. (Apparently, Adolf and Hirohito fought the war alone.)

Similar situation in North Korea today. Believe the locals and you'd think the entire country had been waiting to welcome "Dear American liberators." (Hmmm... wonder who was shooting at us? Flying saucers?)

Amazing feature is fact that almost every single snap of Uncle Joe, which pictured him as a kindly old man who loves dogs, cats, babies and mother, have disappeared. And our spies say that three-four weeks ago they blanketed North Korea. They must have had one whamming wash-day here, with brains and boulevards cleaned of Communist chants.

Climb Mountain For Crash Victims

Parents of 19 Among
58 Dead in Plane

CORPS France, Nov. 15 (UP)—Two hundred mountain climbers set out before dawn today to bring 58 mangled bodies from the wreckage of a Canadian airliner that crashed into 8700-foot Monte De L'Obiou.

There were no survivors in the crash Monday—the second major air disaster in the French Alps in a fortnight. Forty-eight persons were killed aboard an Air India Constellation several days earlier.

The Monday crash victims were 37 Canadian pilgrims to a Catholic beatification ceremony in Rome and American Joseph Butera of Brooklyn, N. Y.

Among those aboard the Curlew-Reid airliner were Mrs. and Mrs. Alphonse Michaud, who were chosen by the Catholic Church to visit Rome because they had a "model family" of 19 children.

Michaud, 55, and his 51-year-old wife received the blessing of Pope Pius XII on behalf of the citizens of Pleassville, Quebec. Twelve of the Michaud children are under 19 years old. The youngest is 6.

"They still do not believe it has happened," their parish priest said in Quebec. "They are too shocked to realize they no longer have a father and mother."

Bishop's Aid Tells
Of Reading Lack

The German people are so eager for reading materials that they will pick up any little crumpled bit of printed matter from the sidewalk.

Dr. Edwin R. Garrison, administrative assistant to Bishop Richard C. Raines in the Indiana Methodist area, made this observation of his recent trip to Germany.

Dr. Garrison said he saw many Germans seated in busses and elsewhere avidly reading dirty scraps of papers. Because of the lack of lesson and hymn books in churches, he says it is quite imperative that Hoosier Methodists carry out their goal of rebuilding the church's publishing house in Frankfurt. It was bombed out during the war.

Found Germans 'Cheerful'
The visiting clergyman found the Germans "cheerful and reasonably optimistic." The food situation in the country is much improved but fuel is still quite scarce, he said. The Germans "turn out" in large numbers for church services and more children attend Sunday school than the total memberships of the churches.

He deplored the sale of magazines from the United States with their sex and crime stories. These he feels give a distorted impression of life in our country. By contrast, Russia sells at a very low price for propaganda purposes beautiful magazines which exalt family life, he said.

Germans in UN Force
Many of the thoughtful Christian people of Germany doubt the wisdom of creating a German armed force that would be in any real sense autonomous," Dr. Garrison continued. "They think if

Germans are armed they should be a part of the United Nations forces. This is because of the tendency of a German under arms to become a "total soldier."

He talked with leaders in hospitals and schools to gather information for the Indiana Methodist effort in Germany as part of the denomination's "Advance for Christ and His Church."

In addition to the German advance projects, Dr. Garrison plans to lay the groundwork in the state for a laymen's training school similar to the Methodist School of the Prophets for ministers and to blueprint ways to inspire more young men to enter the ministry.


