

Compromise Seen On License Plum

**Haerle in Line
For Directorship**

A month-long tussle between Marion County Republican factions over the \$40,000 a year motor license plum appeared to have ended in a compromise maneuver today.

The latest report from intra-party maneuvers was that Edwin Haerle, 11th District GOP chairman, was in the top position for appointment as director of license distribution in Marion County.

Significantly, his appointment would bypass John W. (Jack) Innis, Marion County Republican Chairman, who would normally be in line for the appointment since it has been the custom for years to hand out the license plums to county chairmen.

No Official Word

Mr. Haerle, who has been aligned with the James Bradford wing of the GOP here many years, said he had not received any official word from Secretary of State Leland Smith under whose office the license bureau operates.

Mr. Haerle added, however: "I am ready and willing to accept the appointment if and when one is offered to me."

Secretary of State Smith said he wasn't ready this morning to make the appointment but would "have something on it by tomorrow."

County Chairman Innis said he hadn't "heard a thing from anybody on the subject."

The compromise maneuver was reported to have included Mr. Innis in the setup as an assistant director along with some other party faithfuls in the Bradford faction.

But Mr. Haerle declined to discuss possible assistants in the event of his appointment.

Ties In With Election

The tussle over the appointment ties in closely with maneuvers during the election campaign to replace Mr. Innis as county chairman.

This apparently was "compromised" also in a recent agreement in which Chairman Innis would stand by for the appointment of a "city Republican chairman" to conduct party affairs in the coming mayoralty election next year.

The motor license appointment conflict was the aftermath of a bitter fight during the primary election campaign between Mr. Haerle and Frank Fairchild for the GOP Prosecutor nomination. Mr. Fairchild won by a close margin in a so-called victory for the anti-organization forces.

Mr. Haerle's appointment would indicate the old Bradford wing of the party was getting back in the saddle again.

Netherlands Envoy Sees Ultimate UN Victory

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (UP)—Dr. J. Herman Van Roijen, Netherlands ambassador to the United States, said last night that his country never had regretted the United Nations' decision to combat Communist aggression in Korea.

Dr. Van Roijen told the St. Nicholas Society of New York that the Netherlands was confident that the United Nations forces would be victorious because "we know from experience that losing a battle does not mean anything in regard to the issue of the campaign." He said a campaign for the freedom of the world "cannot be lost."

Former Beulah Overall Gives Birth to Son

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7 (UP)—Mrs. Beulah Overall Cannon, 21, acquitted with Bud Collum in 1948 of murdering her parents with a dynamite timebomb, gave birth to a premature son Friday. It was revealed today.

Mrs. Cannon, now the wife of a former policeman, was found innocent in a sensational California trial of killing her parents by blowing up their yacht at Newport Harbor.

The son, Stephen, weighed 2 pounds, 11½ ounces. He will remain in an incubator at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital until he weighs about 5 pounds.
