Dates Are Listed

Any grammar school pupil who will not be 16 before May 25 may compete. Preliminary spelldowns for grammar school pupils in Indianapolis will be held in city park community centers. Second round of the preliminaries will be the week of Apr. 16. Semifinals will be held Apr. 27, and the finals Apr. 28.

Marion county schools will hold their own eliminations. Two winners from each township will compete against Indianapolis winners in the semifinals.

The final winner will spend a week in Washington, D. C. to see the sights and compete in the National Spelling Bee.

Valuable prizes will be awarded in both the local and national competitions.

Atomic Particles Counted in Flash

Device Takes Only Billionth of Second

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Mar. 8.—An atomic particle can be counted in a billionth of a second by new electronic techniques developed by Stanford physicists.

Advantage is taken in the improved device of the fluorescent light that flashes when an atomic particle passes through atomic crystals or liquids.

The scintillation counter made by Dr. Richard F. Post and a team of physicists gets extra speed by operating at 4000 volts instead of the 1000 volts used on tube of earlier scintillation counters, which are supersensitive cousins of Geiger counters.

State Highway Detours Listed

The State Highway Commission today announced the following detours on highways closed because of construction.

In Ind. 1—North of Goshen: two miles over city streets and county gravel. Ind. 14—Closed immediately west of Danville (Clinton County); detour one mile over county roads.

In Ind. 22—Bridge out one mile west of Roads 301 and 302; detour 11 miles over Roads 301, 22 and 1.

In Ind. 32—Bridge out of Hobartville; 10 miles over Roads 32, 12.

In Ind. 33—Bridge out and detour 3 miles east of Moore Haven; detour 25 miles over Road 46 and 59.

In Ind. 58—From Ind. 14 to Road 19 in Jasper County; 22 miles over Roads 14, 58 and 19.

In Ind. 68—Closed North of Owensville for bridge repair; detour 15 miles over Roads 41 and 68.

Ind. 69—Closed South of Mt. Vernon; about four miles over county roads (one bridge damaged); detour 10 miles over road wrecked by truck. Ferry closed at Ohio River.

Ind. 114—From Road 105 to Road 9 in Huntington and Whitley counties; 12 miles over Roads 105 and 98. Ferry closed at Wabash River.


