Blackwood on Bridge—

Double of Opponent's Overcall in Minor Suit Should Be Quickest Double of All

WATCH MR. MASTERS play and you will see how quickly he doubles an opponent's overcall of two in a minor suit. This should be the quickest double of all.

In every bid you make at bridge you are measuring the probable loss if things go wrong against the probable gain if they go right. When you double your opponents into game the loss is considerable. You must be pretty sure of your ground, then, when you double a contract of two in a major or three in a minor.

But when you double a bid of two clubs or two diamonds, your loss is not so much even if things go wrong. Even if the contract is made, the opponents do not get credit for a game.

Therefore, you can take a much bigger chance in this situation. In other words you have a chance for a big gain at the risk of only a small loss.
