Mr. Griffey resided at 3117 N. New Jersey St. He was 73. Born in Augusta, he was a lifelong resident of Marion County, and Indianapolis, continuing to maintain a residence here after he moved to Bradenton two years ago.

Retires in 1944

He was named acting superintendent of county schools in March 1941, when J. Malcolm Dunn, elected superintendent, was called to military duty. In August of 1941 he was elected to a four-year term as superintendent, retiring in 1944 because of ill health.

The suit asked that Mr. Freyen be eliminated as a candidate on the grounds that he is not a legal resident of Indianapolis.

Seek to Equalize County Salaries

Board to Study Inequalities

Three Marion County councilmen today were appointed to a special county salary commission to eliminate inequalities in pay scales for the county's 1,200 employees.

Howard Morse, council presi-

dent, appointed Conn J. Sterling, Ft. Wayne, director of the State Revenue Department, to be in charge of the banquet arrangements.

Jasper Jones, member of the State Highway Commission, has been named head of a subcommittee on special guests; Walter Mycock, State Public Works and Supply director, will be ticket chairman; Mrs. Joseph G. Wood, Indianapolis, will be in charge of decorations; Marion Ayres, State Commerce and Public Relations director, program chairman; James Miller, Indianapolis entertainment chairman and Robert Hoover, Indianapolis, banqueting.

Salaries vary widely in the various departments at present and workers have asked for pay increases.

The survey, indorsed by the whole council, is intended to set the pattern for salary scales to be included in the county budget for next year.

Wants Outside Help
