

# Iran Charges U. S. Meddles in Oil Row

## WORLD REPORT

Stand Supporting Britain Is 'Undesirable,' American Envoy Told

TEHRAN, Iran, May 22—Iran accused the United States last night of interfering in this country's internal affairs by supporting Britain in the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute.

Foreign Minister Bagher Kazemi summoned U. S. Ambassador Henry Grady to the foreign office and handed him a statement criticizing the United States view that the disagreement be settled by negotiations between Britain and Iran.

Iran recently nationalized its oil industry and cancelled a long-term British concession. The British government protested the action and demanded the question be settled bilaterally.

The Iranian statement handed Mr. Grady said the United States had "created a very undesirable and unexpected impression" in Iranian circles.

It probably will be allowed to build armed forces above treaty limits, but many Washington officials today thought the Italians are pressing the issue too fast.

Italian Foreign Minister Carlo Sforza, on Sunday, boldly declared "this is the opportune moment to start treaty revisions."

The United States cannot espouse readmission of Italy now because it is denouncing Russia for letting its satellites in eastern Europe build armed forces bigger than their treaties allow.

TENS of thousands of Spanish workers boycotted transportation systems, shops and even their favorite taverns today in a protest against the high cost of living. The streets were filled with soldiers and police alerted for possible violence.

DEPUTY DEFENSE MINISTER P. GOSNAJAK charged to-day that Yugoslavia's Cominform neighbors are mobilizing on the border and making the area "ready for war."

### Arms Control

THE United States put before the United Nations today a plan for combining the atomic energy and conventional armaments commission in one more effort to reconcile east and west on international arms control.

### Latin America

MEXICO CITY butchers closed their shops today because of an acute meat shortage. The Alliance of Butcher Shop Proprietors said they will not reopen until it becomes "more profitable."

### Far East

THE U. S. House of Representatives today took up the controversial emergency food relief bill for India, which was expected to kick off a long wrangle over administration foreign policy.

House Democratic leaders were confident of passage for the \$190 million loan for India to buy wheat. It has been passed in a similar form by the Senate. A final vote was not expected until later in the week.

EIGHT Communist underground agents were executed to-day at Taipei, Formosa, garrison headquarters announced.

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understood that we would not be able to get any political-military policy until we had been able to see what would happen in this next offensive."

"It is a fact, of course, that this is still a wait-and-see proposition," Gen. Bradley said.

trying to stop the will of the Chinese to be aggressors by killing them off or by stopping them in any other way," Gen. Bradley replied.

"Well, that and the fact that this all added up to the proposed armistice terms. If you want to call it that, which our government was discussing with the other governments involved in Korea, and MacArthur was set over to Gen. MacArthur for command."

Gen. Bradley said Gen. MacArthur himself later "announced" the armistice plan and thus "voided any chance of submitting it as a United Nations proposal."

Sen. Saito asked if the Senate's MacArthur hearings had not resulted in a "more definite policy" on the Korean fighting.

Gen. Bradley said he didn't know that he would "admit that."

Earlier, Sen. Alexander Wiley (R., Wis.) denounced what he saw as a "damned lie" any suggestion that he is plotting to "get" some administration witnesses in the MacArthur investigation.

At the same time Chairman Richard B. Russell (D., Ga.) accused Mr. Wiley of reflecting on the "integrity and motives" of majority members of the Senate Armed Services-Foreign Relations Committee.

Mr. Wiley charged over the week-end that Democratic members of the committee are employing "whitewash" and "cover-up" tactics.

Mr. Wiley said he had seen various inspired newspaper reports to the effect that he has been "a party to a strategy of getting some administration witnesses."

"I say that is a damned lie," he continued.

Mr. Wiley did not specify what reports he was referring to. But there have been newspaper accounts that some of Mr. Wiley's GOP colleagues are angered by his tactics on grounds that he upset a plan to demand that Secretaries of State Dean Acheson disclose details of private White House conversations.

According to these reports Mr. Wiley was "premature" when he forced the vote while Gen. Bradley was testifying.

## U. S. to Establish New Ceilings on Key Items

WASHINGTON, May 22 (UPI)—The government was preparing today to end the general price freeze with new ceilings on many wholesale and retail items including liquor, toys and washing machines.

The order will mean some increases and some rollbacks in prices. It will apply to mark-ups of wholesalers in general and of all retail items still under the freeze.

Officials of the Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) said the new order is awaiting Price Stabilizer Michael V. DiSalle's signature, and probably will be issued later this week.

At the retail level, the order will apply to wines, beer, liquors, soft drinks, ice creams, toys, hardware in general, heavy home appliances such as stoves, refrigerators and washing machines, millwork and lumber and many other items.

The meeting will be conducted by Robert H. Wyatt, president of the State Teachers Association.

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
