Diplomats Think Russians Want 5-Power Parley

LONDON, July 9.—Top European diplomats said today they believe Russia will ask for a Big Five peace conference if the Korean cease-fire efforts are successful.

Their opinion is that fighting in the Far East will not flare up again once a Korean cease-fire is achieved. They said Russia has indicated by her own initiative that she has had enough of that tactic.

Russia's Big Five meeting would include Communist China and the Soviet would prefer to discuss not only an over-all Far Eastern settlement but German rearmament and American bases as well—if she could draw the agenda.

REEFING-UP of Gen. Eisenhower's Army was accelerated today with a Washington announcement that the 433d Troop Carrier Wing will leave soon to join Atlantic Pacific forces. The U. S. already has committed one troop carrier wing and two fighter-bomber wings stationed in Germany to Gen. Eisenhower's Army. Another fighter-bomber wing—including atom-bomb carrying B-29s—is stationed in England.

MILLIONAIRE Frederik Vanderbilt Fields, who peeled off \$50,000 in bail for four fugitive Communist leaders, expected to walk out of a New York jail today after spending a week-end behind bars because his friends couldn't raise \$10,000 for his freedom. He was locked up Friday for refusing to tell who contributed to the Civil Rights Congress bail fund.

MARSHAL JOSEF STALIN's "failing health" is one of the latest "expert" theories drifting out of London on why the Communists initiated cease-fire talks.

Eight Rescued From Bay After Boat Breaks Up

DEALE, Md., July 9.—Four young women and four youths, who tied themselves together and swam for hours in choppy Chesapeake Bay waters after their cabin cruiser broke up, were rescued today.

A ninth survivor, Philip Klosky, 23, of Washington, D. C., touched off the search for the other eight last night by swimming almost two and a half miles to give the alarm.

Although exhausted, he refused medical aid and jumped into a boat to help in the search. His fiancée, Rita McDonald of Washington, D. C., was among the eight out in the white-capped waters.

"I've got to get out there, I've got to get out there," Mr. Klosky told those who tried to detain him.

Gave Instructions
Miss McDonald credited her fiancée and Victor Fortwengler, both former Navy Sailors, for their "cool-headed instructions" when the cruiser began breaking up for saving their lives.

"The girls were put over the side first with life preservers and the boys handed us a tow line," Miss McDonald said. "Then they came over the side. We all clung to the tow line."

"When we began drifting fast with the tide, Philip decided to swim to shore and get help. 'We were all calm but scared. Most of the time we just floated on our backs. The waves were pretty high.'

"We swam a little but not too much. The tide and waves just took us along. When we spotted the ketch which rescued us, we all began shouting—the sight of that boat was the something I'll never forget."

The eight apparently had been in the water for about three hours while a Coast Guard flying boat dropped fares and many small boats scoured the area off West River, Md.

The eight, all of the Washington area, included Mr. Fortwengler's wife. She is four months pregnant.

Navy Defends Paint Deal, Hits Brownson

Hoosier Representative To Press Inquiry

WASHINGTON, July 9.—New Navy Secretary Dan A. Kimball replied today to an inquiry by Rep. Charles B. Brownson, Indianapolis Republican about a Navy gray paint deal.

Mr. Kimball's letter, which Rep. Brownson made public indicates the amount of Navy gray was overestimated in the Brownson inquiry by 6 million gallons and the purchase price of the tinting material by almost a dollar a gallon.

"Not Completely Satisfied"
Mr. Brownson declared he is not completely satisfied with the Navy's reasoning and will investigate further and lay his findings before an Armed Services subcommittee as he has been invited to do.

A member of the House Committee on Executive Expenditures and the subcommittee investigating the disposal of surplus, Mr. Brownson launched his one-man inquiry on information provided by a fellow paint dealer in Indianapolis.

Navy Paid \$140 More

George Gable, secretary-treasurer of the Perfection Paint & Color Co., Indianapolis, wrote that a German firm offered to sell his company tinting paint at \$1.25 which the company had sold the Navy originally for \$2.65. The Indianapolis concern had sold 100,000 gallons of the tint which Mr. Brownson estimated would make "8 million gallons of Navy gray paint, or enough to give 10,666 battleships of the Missouri class one coat each."

Surplus Sold

He asked the Navy Secretary why such excessive purchases of tinting was made and also how STEG, Inc., S. Surplus Sales Corporation in Germany, was able to turn it over so cheaply and at what loss.

Secretary Kimball replied that his investigation disclosed that the 100,000 gallons of blue-black tint had been bought from Perfection at \$1.658 per gallon. It was to be used in making camouflage paint and would mix to about 2 million gallons, he said. Later ready-mixed paint was found more suitable and the surplus was sold through STEG by the State Department.

Mr. Brownson intends to ask State what they got for it, he said.

Making Its Own

All Navy paint is now being made in its own plants, Secretary Kimball reported.

Mr. Brownson said he thinks the Navy could have used the tint in their own paint making. He intends to ask the Navy a new set of questions, he said.

Truslow, Former Head Of Curb Exchange, Dies

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 9 (UP)—Francis Adams Truslow, 45, former president of the New York Curb Exchange, died of a heart attack yesterday aboard the Moore McCormac liner Argentina.

Mr. Truslow was en route to Brazil as U. S. Commissioner on the U. S.-Brazil Joint Commission for Economic Development. Surviving are his wife and four children who were with him.
