

Fire Student Editor For Attending E. Berlin Rally

CHICAGO, Oct. 5—The University of Chicago announced last night it has fired the editor of the student newspaper for attending the Communist-sponsored East Berlin Youth Festival.

The school said it also has suspended publication of the weekly paper, the Chicago Maroon, until further notice.

Maroon staff members were reported up in arms over the action. They scheduled a campus protest meeting for next Tuesday night.

Staff Very Angry

A Maroon member, who refused use of his name, said that "the staff is very angry and will fight this to the end."

The university, recently threatened with a congressional investigation of alleged Communist activity on the campus, acted through dean of students Robert M. Strozier.

Mr. Strozier sent a letter to the home of the editor, Allan D. Kimmel, 2430 Chicago, notifying him of his ouster. Mr. Strozier said Mr. Kimmel still was in Eastern Europe.

Called Unfair

"We feel it is unfair because Mr. Kimmel went to Europe as an individual, not as a representative of the Maroon," the student said.

The suspension order is effective after today's issue. It was the first such action against the student newspaper in its 59-year history.

Mr. Strozier informed Mr. Kimmel that his attendance at the youth rally "shows your lack of qualifications to edit a free and independent newspaper."

Allows Cable Firm To Close Down Pacific Operations

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5—The Federal Communications Commission yesterday authorized the Commercial Pacific Cable Co. to close down its Trans-Pacific operations.

The company has lost \$1,006,105 the past five years.

It operates cables from San Francisco to Honolulu and on through to Midway Island and Guam. Another cable links Guam and Manila. Prior to the outbreak of World War II the company's cables linked Manila and Shanghai, and Guam and Japan's Bonin Islands.

The commission provided that service must be continued between Guam and Honolulu via Midway until three days after RCA Communications, Inc., puts into operation radio telegraph facilities linking Guam with continental United States. The Guam station is expected to go into operation about Oct. 15.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration informed the commission that the small amount of commercial traffic from Midway could be handled over government facilities.

The commission noted that RCA and other radio carriers are now providing satisfactory service between the United States, Hawaii, and the Philippines, and that Commercial never was able to receive permission to resume traffic to Shanghai and the Bonins.

According to a commission spokesman, few employees are affected and all will be absorbed by other carriers.

Says New Solution Can Get Rid of Radioactivity

PORTRLAND, Ore., Oct. 5 (UPI)—A 31-year-old Portland chemist says the government granted him a patent for a solution which "will get rid of radioactivity."

The inventor, Jack De Ment, said the "atomic wash" is a mixture of water and silicon tetra chloride. The compound attaches to most radioactive atoms and hooks them up with insoluble silicates.

"In other words," Mr. De Ment explained, "the atoms form a sort of gelatin solid, making it easier to wash them from large surfaces."

The chemist said he developed the solution, intended primarily for defense workers, in 1947 for use when and if A-bomb dust falls on a city. Existence of the wash was kept secret until about a month ago.
