Shoe Fit Important To Growth

MANY foot defects among early school-agers stem from the fact that mothers don't know enough about proper fitting. Since different children develop differently, it isn't possible to make specific rules applicable to everyone. However, it is important to concentrate on accurate shoe fit that leaves room for growth, taking care that soles are of flexible leather so that they provide sufficient support and ventilation.

OTHER POINTS to keep in mind when dealing with "special" problems are: Is your child large for his age? Remember that bones and muscles develop according to his age, not his height. Therefore, the strength of his foot may be lagging behind his size. For that reason, he will need lightweight soles, with leather soles of more than normal pliability. Perhaps the child is small for his age but with foot bones and muscles more maturely developed. He will take a sturdier shoe than the boy or girl of average height.

A CHUBBY CHILD has a predisposition to weak feet because of the extra weight. In order to prevent cramping of muscles, his shoes should have plenty of spread room at the toes.

An underweight youngster generally has a long bony foot whose ligaments tend to looseness and flaccidity. Since such feet elongate easily, it is necessary to measure the size in a standing position.

Wise selection at an early age insures the child against foot ailments later on.
