

## DePauw Visits Butler At Fieldhouse Tonight

WHAT'S IN a nemesis? For Butler it could well be DePauw's Lee Hamilton.

Lee and his mates visit Fieldhouse Bulldogland at 8:15 tonight. Butler's just hoping Hamilton isn't up to par. He's killed 'em in the 'Tigers' three wins over Butler in the last two years.

The estimable Mr. Hamilton owns a 13-point average for the 'Tigers' six games, four of which they've won. Helping him maintain that mark are Forwards Kent Guild and Bob Ratzer and Guards Harry Stewart and Bob Pierce. All can look at a scorebook without a feeling of inferiority.

STEWART USED to play for Howe High School. And Pierce wore Lafayette Jeff's colors in two state tournament final drives. Neither boy left his good basketball in high school.

DePauw's 4-2 record is better than Butler's. The Bulldogs, though, have met sterner opposition. Included in their six losses in eight games are five defeats by Big Ten clubs.

But Butler is working on a win chain now. Already forged is link No. 1, a 73-58 decision over Evansville Wednesday. Should

they win tonight they'll equal their best "streak" efforts of the last two seasons.

DEPAUW HAS a three-game streak going, but that advantage may be dulled by a 17-day layoff. The 'Tigers' haven't played since Dec. 19.

The Bulldogs have three big problems tonight: Stopping Hamilton, reducing errors and improving free-throw shooting. They've averaged 20-plus errors a game and have lost three games at the free throw line.

Tonight's Bulldog starting ensemble will feature Orville Burdall and Bob Reed at forwards, Ray Stewart at center, and Don Holloway and Mike Radkovic at guards. Reed, a "B" team man before impressing in the Hoosier Classic, has scored 20 points in his two varsity games.

The game will be the 54th between the two schools. Butler leads in the series, 36-17. F.A.

## UP's Prep Big 10 Sticks By Power Rating Lineup

Don't blame it on leap year, but for once, at least, Indiana's high school basketball clubs today appeared to have solved the upset jinx.

With few scattered exceptions, the form chart proved accurate as the first major program of 1952 rolled off. The five "big shots" in the United Press "Big Ten" in action all chalked up victories—East Chicago Washington, South Bend Central, Ft. Wayne North, Winslow and Jasper.

Eye-openers included Whiting's 52-to-41 licking by Hammond on the losers' floor which knocked them out of the West NIHSC lead. It was Whiting's second loss in 10 games, while Hammond picked up its fifth win in nine starts.

SHELBYVILLE missed a golden opportunity to draw even with SoSouthport in the SoSouth Central Conference by losing at a four-way tie for the East NIHS crown by overcoming La Porte's 18-15 to 9-lead and winning out, 62 to 51, for victory No. 8. Ft. Wayne North, Winslow and Jasper, ranked eighth through 10th respectively, racked up easy wins. North Side humbled cross-town rival South, 51 to 40. Winslow won its 11th game in 12 starts from Oakland City, 77 to 64, and Jasper blasted Elkhorn, 74 to 44, in a Southern loop game.

## Fund Raising By Loyola U. Stopped Short

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5.—A flash of enthusiasm that spread over the Loyola University campus when well-wishers offered to raise funds so that the school might continue football next season died suddenly today.

A snowballing movement was started at Jesuit School's annual football banquet Thursday night to raise a fund to support a team. Before the banquet ended pledges totaling \$50,000 had been subscribed and by last night the sum increased to nearly \$60,000.

But the movement was stopped by a statement from the Rev. Lorenzo Malone, S. J., vice president of Loyola and a member of its board of Athletic Control.

"Loyola wishes sincerely to thank the alumni, friends and well-wishers who so generously offered financial support to the university to carry on in inter-collegiate football," he said.

"It is with regret that during the existing emergency inter-collegiate football be discontinued."

Head Football Coach Jordan Oliver and his assistants, John McKenna, Jerry Neri and Harry Acquarrelli, who had indicated they would postpone plans to look for other jobs when there seemed a chance football would be carried on by Loyola, were freed by last night's announcement to seek other employment, a university spokesman said.

## Rawls, Suggs Lead Tourney

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 5 (UPI)—Betty Rawls of Austin, Tex., and Louise Suggs of Carrollton, Ga., shared a one-stroke lead today as most of the nation's top lady golfers began the second round of the Jacksonville Women's Open Championship.

Miss Rawls and Miss Suggs shot three-under-par 73's yesterday and wound up the first 18 with a stroke advantage over Mrs. Babe Didrikson Zaharias of Tampa, Fla., the defending champion, and Mary Lena Faulk of Thomasville, Ga., who posted 74's.

The top four were the only entrants who bettered woman's par of 76 over the 6282-yard Brentwood municipal course in the opening round.

## Vejar Impressive In Garden Victory

NEW YORK, Jan. 5 (UPI)—Young Chico Vejar and his solid lead were definitely established on the "big time" today because of his impressive decision victory over veteran Enrique Bolanos at Madison Square Garden.

The 20-year-old welterweight from Stamford, Conn., was being offered top-flight opponents for another Garden fight next month because of the 10-round drubbing he gave 27-year-old Bolanos of Pasadena, Cal., last night.

Vejar scaled 146½ pounds and Bolanos, 143. Just a half-pound under the weight limit, young Chico was fast and explosive. But Bolanos at 143 looked like an over-stuffed and washed-up lightweight.

Rams' Coach Signed To New 3-Year Pact



## New Snowfall Hits Midwest

Sleet and rain pelted the Atlantic seaboard today as a moisture-laden front swept eastward after laying a blanket of four to six inches of snow on the Midwestern states.

Forecasters said the wet weather would continue through out today.

But a band of mild weather moved into the Midwest, bringing with it more comfortable temperatures but also increasing the danger of flooding from the runoff of melting snow.

Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin and southern Michigan yesterday caught the worst of the new snowfall that swept up from Oklahoma and moved northeastward.

A total of four inches of snow fell in the Chicago area, bringing the season's total to 81.6 inches, well past the normal 33.4 inches for an entire winter.

Caribou, Me., and Old Town, Me., were the coldest places in the nation, with identical temperatures of 17 degrees below zero.

## 3600 More File For State Bonus

The Indiana legislature's special session extension of the state soldier bonus application filing deadline added more than 3,600 new claims to the list and boosted the estimated cost by around \$1.5 million.

Clinton Green, director of the state veterans' affairs department, reported that many claims were filed between April 30 and Dec. 31, the last of two extension deadlines.

There are now 342,000 claims on file and officials estimate the bonus will cost \$128,500,000. Disbursed veterans and survivors of deceased servicemen already have received \$24 million. About \$32 million more is on hand for the remaining claims, which won't be paid until all the money is collected from a state gross income surtax.

Wage stabilization problems were discussed by 150 Hoosier workers yesterday at the World War Memorial.


Sponsored by the Indiana Manufacturers Association and Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce, the session opened a series of Indiana meetings to consider employees' problems.

## 4951 Added to U.S. Payroll in November

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UPI)—The government added 4951 civilians to its payroll last November, almost all of them industrial workers in the Defense Department. Sen. Harry F. Byrd reported today.

The Virginia Democrat, chairman of the joint committee on reduction of non-essential federal expenditures, said "blue collar" workers in the military establishment accounted for all but 44 persons of the net increase.

The total November payroll was 2,503,070. The Defense Department, which reported a decrease in white-collar employees, accounted for 1,274,187 of the total, and civilian agencies had 1,228,883 workers.

## Says Truman Will Run Only Against Taft


