

WHAT GOES ON HERE

Invisible, non-exploding bombs may rain down on Indianapolis next Saturday.

Nearly 1000 planes will fly over the seven-state Great Lakes region during a simulated air attack, designed to sharpen the eyes and ears of the Ground Observer Corps, a group of 25,000 civilian volunteers.

Plots from the Civilian Air Patrol, the Tactical Air Command, the Air National Guard and the Naval Air Reserve will be winging through the blue while the GOC volunteers spot them and relay information to the nearest of nine filter centers. The news then goes to intercept stations, which send out fighters-interceptors of Eastern Air Defense Force to knock down the "enemy" aircraft.

Your Federal Job

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (Special)—Civil Service Commission tentatively has decided against imposing new restrictions on promotions for Uncle Sam's many Indianapolis area per diem (blue collar) employees, and an estimated 800,000 elsewhere.

It has decided that the present promotion system, which rests mainly on seniority, fully meets the requirement of the so-called Whitten rider.

As revised last fall, this rider set up definite waiting periods for promotions in the Classified (white collar) Federal service. And it directed CSC to work out similar rules for blue collar employees.

CSC, however, points out that advancement for blue collar employees traditionally has been based on length of service, which, of itself, involves specific waiting periods for promotion. And this, it has decided, rules out the possibility of over-rapid promotions—the thing the Whitten rider was designed to prevent.

Rundown

Upwards of 50,000 indefinite employees of the postal service, including many in the Indianapolis area, will get a pleasant windfall under the new annual leave system effective Jan. 6.

They will get retroactive credit

for annual leave benefits which have been denied them since Dec. 1, 1950.

The retroactive leave will go only to postal indefinite status on the payroll. It will be credited under the old postal leave system—15 days per year or 1 1/4 days per month. Future leave for indefinite will be on the new, graduated plan.
