

The 'Prince of Said' Is Born—

101-Gun Salvos Rock Egypt For 1st Heir to Farouk's Throne

CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 16.—A crown prince was born today to 18-year-old Queen Narriman, the beautiful commoner who became King Farouk's second wife last May 6.

Farouk issued a royal command saying his son would get the title of "Prince of Said," Prince of Lower Egypt.

The government declared an official holiday and all Egypt joined Farouk in celebrating the birth of his first son—named Ahmed Fouad for the king's father. Both mother and son were reported doing well.

10,000 Gather to Cheer

Simultaneously 101-gun salvos boomed in Cairo, Alexandria and Port Said. Radio Cairo said the glad event was a "good omen" in Egypt's struggle to expel the British from the Suez Canal zone and the Sudan.

By mid-morning, some 10,000 cheering Egyptians had massed in the square before Abdin Palace. The crowd grew steadily. Secondary school students were marching toward the palace from all sections of the city.

The king's bodyguard donned bright red fezzes, white gloves and other ceremonial dress. Mounted guards at the palace gates sat on prancing horses and held lances from which fluttered their regimental flags.

Some 500 police in black uniforms and khaki-clad auxiliary police moved through the square to keep order. Cheers for Farouk and the new crown prince rang out continuously.

"Thank God"

Reports from the palace said that Farouk, on learning that Narriman had been delivered safely of a boy, said, "Thank God."

"Tears of Joy"

"The birth of a crown prince is a blessed, happy event," he said as he entered the meeting.

God," and went directly to the queen's chamber. There he kissed his new son and congratulated Narriman.

The king ordered distribution of money gifts, refreshments and sweets among palace officials. He made Dr. Magdy a Pasha and conferred the title of bey on the gynecologist's assistant, Dr. Abdel Halim Rateb.

Premier Mustapha El Nahas Pasha called a special cabinet meeting.

Workers, demonstrating near the premier's office shouted: "Victory will come from your hands, oh crown prince."

The rector of Al Azhar University distributed \$11,480 among students there in celebration of the birth.

When the premier heard the news he telephoned Farouk and told him that "tears of joy are filling my eyes and I can scarcely express to your majesty my happiness at this great news."

"May God bless you, grant the crown prince long life and keep the queen in the best of health," The king thanked the premier.

Royal princes, ministers, diplomats and other notables flocked to the palace to sign the register and congratulate Farouk, who will be 32 Feb. 11.

All school and university students were given a two-day holiday.

Florist shops were flooded with orders to send flowers to the palace.

Queen Narriman gave birth to the crown prince at 2:30 a. m. (Indianapolis Time).

The child was King Farouk's fourth, but his first son. His first wife, Queen Farida, gave him three daughters before they were divorced Nov. 17, 1945.

Cites Cost Of 'Needless Antagonisms'

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 16 (CDN)—A Miami air lines employee told the Moral Re-Armament Assembly of the Americas yesterday that "needless antagonisms" are frittering away huge sums of money yearly.

Some 700 representatives of 30 nations are attending the assembly's 11-day conference here.

Howard Page, chief shop steward of Pan American World Airways, said that "overhead friction"—or needless antagonism—"is costing one out of every two dollars earned" in the United States today.

Declaring that both management and labor are at fault in disputes, Mr. Page suggested a solution in which "men and women would examine their problems in the MRA light of what is right instead of who is right."

Rear Adm. Sir Edward Coghane, Royal Navy, retired, and head of the British convoy service in World War II, said that MRA is eliminating friction in British industries.

Shankra Hedge of Bombay said that when he was an anarchist, he tried to blow up the Bank of India and communication installations. Now he's president of the All-India Air Employees Association.

Mr. Hedge said he is hopeful that MRA will "lead us from misery and from the danger of a third world war."

Family Dies in Fire

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Jan. 16 (UP)—An American naval officer and his wife, two children, and a maid were killed today when fire destroyed their home.

The officer was Lt. Cmdr. Victor Hempsire. His home town and the names of the other victims were not disclosed.

Push Hard for Probe of Justice Dept.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—An investigation of the Justice Department by the House Judiciary Committee may be under way in another week.

Republican members are pressing hard for it.

Rep. Kenneth Keating (R. N.Y.) has proposed to the committee that a seven-man subcommittee be appointed. He was promised his resolution will be considered next Tuesday.

Rep. Keating and other Republican members who favor the investigation believe it will be approved. They say there is considerable embarrassment among their Democratic colleagues over the presidential announcement that Attorney General J. Howard McGrath has been selected to "clean up" his own department.

A number of Democrats, they say, are unwilling to vote against an investigation.

Approval by the entire House is not required. The judiciary committee has general jurisdiction over Justice Department matters.

Rep. Keating proposes that four members be appointed by the chairman, Rep. Emanuel Celler (D. N. Y.) and three by Rep. Chauncey W. Reed (R. Ill.), ranking Republican member.

Presumably, Rep. Reed would select Republicans who have demanded such an investigation, such as Rep. Patrick J. Hillings of California, Rep. Claude I. Baskerville of Missouri and Rep. Keating. All three have demanding Mr. McGrath's resignation or removal.

Rep. Hillings made a recent personal investigation in San Francisco of charges of misconduct by the U. S. attorney there and of some of his deputies, in connection with attempts to present internal revenue evidence to a grand jury.

He has laid before Congress eight instances of alleged misconduct in San Francisco involving officials of the Justice Department.

Similar information from other states will be before the judiciary committee when it takes up the Keating resolution.

Lay GI Death To Hospital Negligence

Negligence of General Hospital doctors was blamed today for the death of a Camp Atterbury mess sergeant in the murder trial of cafe owner Edwin Husbands.

Attorneys of Husbands charged that Sgt. William Jagloski, 28th Division GI, died because two punctures of his intestines were not treated.

"Five other holes were sutured, but the two were not found until an autopsy was performed," Attorney Paul Blackwell charged. "His death was caused through neglect of the hospital."

Husbands, owner of Eddie's Cafe, 401 E. Washington St., is on trial in Criminal Court 2 for second-degree murder in the fatal shooting of Sgt. Jagloski June 29.

The shooting stemmed from a fight in the cafe after several soldiers criticized the mess sergeant's "chow." Husbands told police he shot Sgt. Jagloski after he refused to leave. The GI died 10 days later.

In his opening statement to the jury of seven men and five women, Deputy Prosecutor Robert Orblison said "it is a clear-cut case of murder."

Mr. Orblison said Husbands took the gun from a safe, shot the sergeant, then "very calmly" returned the gun to the safe and locked it.

The jury was chosen late yesterday after Judge Saul T. Rabb ordered sheriff's deputies to pull in prospective jurors from downtown streets to fill the panel.

Attlee to Address Group in Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 16 (UP)—Former Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee of Great Britain will speak at a dinner of the Philadelphia Fellowship Commission and Fellowship House Mar. 5, co-chairmen of the two organizations' joint membership drive said today.

Mayor Joseph S. Clark Jr. said the city will aid in welcoming Mr. Attlee on his first visit here.

Seek Clue In Slaying Of Artist

TERRE HAUTE, Jan. 16.—Authorities today scanned the life of a handsome 31-year-old artist and former war prisoner for clues to his brutal slaying in a lovers' lane.

Vincent Richard Broyles' battered body was found in his blood-soaked car last night by three small boys, about 150 yards from a main intersection in a fashionable residential section.

Police believed at first he had been beaten to death. His throat also was bruised as though he had been choked. But an autopsy revealed a bullet in his brain caused death, probably early yesterday.

Fail to Find Gun

A night-long search of the area, aided by floodlights, failed to turn up the small caliber gun which police believe was used.

Unknown to authorities was the motive of the killer.

"Everything now points to robbery," Detective Chief James J. Evelo told The Times today. Mr. Broyles' billfold was missing and his pockets had been emptied.

But Sheriff John Trierweiler said his investigators were looking for other motives. Mr. Broyles was believed to have carried only a small amount of cash.

Savagery Unexplained

Also unexplained was the savagery of the beating. His skull had been fractured a number of times.

The slain man's wife, Lois, 28, was unable to provide any leads. Her husband left home about 7 p. m. Monday.

Sheriff Trierweiler said Mr. Broyles was seen in a tavern near the Terre Haute Tribune-Star, where he was in charge of the rotogravure section, about 11:20 p. m. Monday. There the trail ended.

Mrs. Broyles explained she had not reported his disappearance because it was not unusual for him to fail to come home.

They have two daughters, 7 and 9.

The well-known artist limped as a result of bone tuberculosis contracted in a German prison camp in which he spent four months in World War II.

His body was found, face down, jammed between the front and rear seats of his auto. His glasses, unbroken, were on the grass beside the car, and his hat was found about 100 feet away.
