Reds Charge Talks Take A Bad Turn

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Wednesday, Jan. 23—The Allies warned today that a "substantial gesture" of compromise by the Communists is necessary if there is to be a realistic armistice.

The Reds said in turn that the truce talks here were taking an "ominous turn" and accused the Allies of "wrecking activities."

The warning that the Reds must do some compromising came from Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, chief spokesman for the United Nations command. He implied that unless the Reds do give some ground to end a 26-day deadlock on prisoners of war and terms for enforcing an armistice the truce talks may end in failure.

A few hours later the Peiping radio, mouthpiece for the Chinese Communist government, made its "ominous turn" statement.

Peiping said that United Nations command "wrecking activities" were "assuming serious proportions just when agreement on agenda item three is in sight."

"We have gone half way and we are waiting for them to come down the road and meet us," Gen. Nuckols said. "Our position is firm."

Reds Move Up Heavy Guns

8TH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Jan. 22 (UP)—The Communists are building up their artillery power along the 145-mile Korean front but apparently for defensive purposes, an 8th Army spokesman said tonight.

During the "twilight" war, the Communists have moved their guns up to the front and dug them deep into the ground, he said. The guns are effectively camouflaged, the spokesman said. However, they still are so far behind the front lines that only the heavier guns of the Allies can reach them, he added.

Propose Segregation Of Juvenile Prisoners

Remodeling of the Marion County Jail to permit proper segregation of juvenile prisoners was urged today by the state Department of Public Welfare.

The recommendation followed one of the department's periodic inspections of the jail.

Inspectors reported conditions at the jail good from standpoints of strength, security, safety and sanitation.

GI Arrested On Phony Check Count

An Indianapolis soldier on duty as a finance clerk at Camp Atterbury was under arrest today on charges of issuing \$5495 worth of fraudulent checks.

The soldier, Charles Keith Simon Jr., 19, of 714 N. Illinois St., faces a U. S. Commissioner's hearing today on the charges, Secret Service agents said.

George B. Loy, agent in charge, said Simon cashed one \$845 check, gave a friend another check for \$850 and that a third, for \$3000 was being processed at Atterbury when the GI was arrested.

Mr. Loy said Simon deposited the \$850 check with the Atterbury branch of Irwin's-Union Trust Co. of Columbus earlier this month and had withdrawn about \$750 of it by writing personal checks.

Simon gave the \$850 check to a friend who was to use the money to pay off the balance which Simon owed on a car he bought recently, Mr. Loy said.

The friend became suspicious when he noticed the check was not made payable to Simon.

Secret Service agents said. Assistant U. S. Attorney E. Andrew Steffan said maximum penalty for the offense is \$1000 fine and 10 years in a federal penitentiary on each violation.
