

Lockman Set To Play First For Giants

NEW YORK, Jan. 22—Whitey Lockman, an outfielder at the beginning of the 1951 season and a first baseman at the end of it, signed his 1952 contract with the New York Giants today and virtually was assured he no longer will be caught in the switches.

The blond, 25-year-old Charlottee, N. C., slugger, transferred to first base last May 21, reportedly was given a slight raise on the basis of his .282 batting average and 12 home runs in 153 games.

IT WAS Lockman's line double in the ninth inning of the final playoff game with Brooklyn last October that kept the Giant rally alive and set the stage for Bobby Thomson's climactic homer.

Lockman, who joined the Giants in 1945 and walked a homer in his first big league trip to the plate, received Manager Leo Durocher's assurance that he will remain at first base.

"Whitey did a good job for us when we brought him in to play first base," said Durocher, looking over his 1952 prospects "and I don't plan to send him back to the outfield. He's going to be our first baseman."

Lockman was the 11th member of the Giants to sign his 1952 contract.

THE PHILADELPHIA Athletics announced the receipt of their first four contracts. General Manager Arthur Ehlers said the contracts came from Pitchers Dick Foster, Carl Scheib, Joe Murray and Roland "Tex" Hoyle.

Utility Infielder Wayne Terwilliger and Rookie Catcher Dick Teed agreed to terms with Brooklyn and Pitcher Joe Landrum, with the Dodgers briefly during 1950, applied for voluntary retirement.

Terwilliger, acquired from the Chicago Cubs in June, hit .227 last season while Teed batted .222 with St. Paul of the American Association.

TWO ROOKIES, Catcher Harry Chitt, who may become the club's first string receiver, and Pitcher Tom Simpson signed with the Cubs. Chitt batted .301 with Des Moines last season while Simpson won six and lost eight for the Buffalo Bisons.

The Red Sox also announced the signing of two rookies, Pitchers Ralph Bricker and Hershell Freeman Jr., up from Birmingham.

Billy Demars, hustling 26-year-old shortstop, was released outright to Toronto of the International League by the St. Louis Browns.

Bobby Ball, who finished fifth in last year's 500-Mile classic, has been voted Arizona's outstanding professional athlete.

Ball was accorded the honor by the Arizona Press Box Association, and won out over such outstanding professional athletes as Alex Kellner, Athletics' pitcher who won the honor two years ago. Lee Salas, professional boxer, Whizzer White of the Chicago Bears professional football team and Don Nicholas, rookie outfielder recently purchased by the White Sox.
