Doctor's License Revoked

The Indiana Board of Registration and Examination in Optometry yesterday revoked the license of Dr. Sol Bizer, Jeffersonville. Dr. Donald W. Conner, secretary-treasurer of the board, said the action was taken because Dr. Bizer was convicted of charges of defrauding the Veterans Administration.

Heavy Cab Tip Snares Suspect

The cab driver said the woman gave him \$8 and told him it was half of what she took from a soldier.

"For fare and tip," he quoted her. But cabbie Frank Osborn, 26, of 641 W. 30th St., called police. They arrested Marie Smith, 24, of 603 E. Ohio St., on a preliminary charge of larceny.

Then they located Pvt. Harold Vandervort, 22, Traverse City, Mich., and returned his \$16, minus \$1.15 cab fare. The GIs still unhappy. Police couldn't help him trace the remainder of the \$88 he said he had early in the evening.

Gains Right to Say 'No' on Projects Here

Stunned public housing officials here have retreated behind a wall of "no comment" following action by City Council to curb their power.

The Council last night passed a resolution requiring the Housing Authority of Indianapolis to submit all future plans for approval before action is taken.

Housing Authority officers had insisted the Council was powerless to halt a hotly-contested South Side project because the Council already had approved it. Council members last night declared the Authority had "gone beyond" what it had told the Council. It would do when basic approval was granted last year.

2000 Fight Project

Source of the wing-clipping action was strong objection by residents in the neighborhood of the Dawson St. and LeGrande Ave. project where the Authority proposed to build 40 double houses. More than 2000 residents have banded together to fight the project and have battled through the Zoning Board and previous sessions of the Council in their efforts to block it.

Earlier speculation by city officials hinted the Authority will test the Council action in a court suit.

Donald Hanson, executive secretary of the Authority, said members of the group were "too surprised" to comment on future plans. The resolution is identical to one which died in committee last year.

Area Earmarked

More than 250 residents of the Dawson-LeGrande area packed Council chambers for the hour-and-a-half hearing in which South Side forces were bolstered by the 34th and Keystone Civic League.

Opinions expressed by Christian J. Emhardt, former mayor, Council president and now a minority member of the body were echoed by other councilmen.

"I am in favor of public housing and always will be until present conditions change," he said. "But, I think the Authority went beyond what they told us they would do when we first gave them a go-ahead."

OKs Annexation

In other action the Council approved annexation of a tract west of Arlington Ave. between 13th and 14th Sts.
