

Swiss Hold Suspect As Slayer Of Vogeler's 'Best Friend'



Swiss Mum On Identity Of Prisoner

BERN, Switzerland, Jan. 23—Swiss federal police announced today they have arrested a man believed connected with the mysterious death two years ago of an American naval attache assigned to Communist Romania.

The attache, Capt. Eugene S. Karpe of Delhi, La., fell or was pushed from the famed Orient Express as it sped through a tunnel in Austria Feb. 23, 1950. The captain's mutilated body was found by a track walker.

Swiss federal Police Chief Walter Balsiger said an "alleged Romanian . . . probably connected" with Karpe's death was arrested "a short while ago."

He refused to give further details, even as to whether the man arrested was the same unidentified Romanian seized soon after Capt. Karpe's death and released after questioning.

Dearest Friend

Chief Balsiger's surprise announcement was the first indication that Karpe's death still was under investigation and that the inquiry had spread to Switzerland.

Capt. Karpe was a close friend of Robert Vogeler, American businessman who only two days before the attache's death had been convicted of espionage in Communist Hungary and sentenced to 15 years in prison.

Capt. Karpe, 45, had visited Mr. Vogeler's wife and two children in Vienna the night before his death. Mrs. Vogeler called him "one of Bob's dearest friends."

He boarded the Orient Express for a trip to Paris en route home on leave and plunged to his death a few hours later south of Salzburg.

Suspect Murder

No official verdict ever was given in the death, but Austrian Interior Minister Oskar Helmer said at the time Capt. Karpe probably had been murdered.

"No trained criminal investigator can lend much credence to the theory that he died by accident, since it was established that his sleeper-car door opened to the inside," Mr. Helmer said.

"Careful interrogation of the train attendants established that none of the windows of the car was open at the time of the incident."

"Karpe was six feet tall—too tall to fall through a window, and you do not look out of windows when a train is passing through a tunnel."

Mr. Helmer also quoted train attendants as saying Capt. Karpe was "perfectly well" before his disappearance and "had not been drinking alcohol."

Lt. O'Neal's Suspension Confirmed

Officer Schwartz had been an acting lieutenant in the traffic division and had been demoted to motorcycle patrolman. He appealed the action to the board, stating he had been promoted under the merit system in 1938 to the permanent rank of sergeant.

The board today ordered him "reassigned as sergeant of police."


