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Nine Rescued Off Arctic Floe

PT. BARROW, Alaska, Mar. 31 (UPI)—Nine men who had been stranded on an Arctic ice floe 779 miles north of here since Thursday were rescued by a skinned equipped patrol bomber. All survivors were in good condition, the Navy reported today.

The successful pickup was made late yesterday by Cmdr. V. J. Coley, officer-in-charge of the Navy's "Operation Skijump," designed to set up oceanographic and weather stations on the polar ice cap.

Cmdr. Coley radioed the base here that he, as co-pilot and six other men were able to land their twin-engined craft after had

weather had blocked previous attempts.

The marooned men were taken aboard along with 2000 pounds of scientific equipment from the downed R4D, which was abandoned. The men are being returned.
