

24 Killed in Crash Of Mexican Bus

HUATUSCO, Mexico, May 26—Political followers of President Huerta today set at a candidate Henriquez Guzman the number killed yesterday man and were en route to Cor when a speeding bus overturned on a curve and plunged into a ravine.

CORBELL, Ont., May 26—Papa Oliva Dionne said today his famous quintuplets at last will escape his ever-watchful eye when they go to college next fall.

"They've all decided they want to go to college," Mr. Dionne said. "They haven't made up their minds which one yet, but it definitely will not be a convent."

Thus he dispelled a rumor that one of the five Canadian girls would become a nun.

He said that his daughters—Emilie, Annette, Yvonne, Marie and Cecile—would have to start making up their own minds Wednesday, when they celebrate their 18th birthday.

The anniversary will have double significance for the girls whose birth on May 28, 1934, startled the world. They and nine classmates will be graduated from their private school Wednesday, and it will be closed as soon as the exercise is concluded.

Family Affair
Mr. Dionne said the birthday party would be a family affair with all 13 of his children participating. He said the day would start with the family attending Mass at their private chapel.

He said he would give each of the girls a rhinestone necklace with a bracelet and earrings to match. Other members of the family are keeping their gifts a secret.

Mr. Dionne said the girls may do their own choosing for husbands, "but the fact is, none of them has any boy friends."

"They have been too busy to think of that sort of thing," he said. "But when they meet a boy, I'm thankful to say they can tell what kind of boy he is."
