Blackwood on Bridge—  
Even an Easy Contract  
Takes a Little Planning

AFTER the opening lead is made, the wise declarer takes a few moments before he plays that first card from dummy. He mentally prepares his overall plan. In today's deal Mr. Heinste got a little too cocky. The contract seemed so easy that apparently no planning was necessary.

Mr. Dale opened the six of hearts and dummy's queen won. Mr. Heinste was delighted with this opening. He had one heart trick home and, after knocking out the ace, the jack would take a second trick in the suit. These tricks, plus six diamonds and the ace of spades, would total an easy nine.

"DALE, you are my favorite opening leader," Mr. Heinste gloated, as he led back the king of hearts at trick two.

Mr. Dale was silent. He won with the ace of hearts and, after some thought, shifted to a small club. Mr. Abel won with the ace and returned the suit. Mr. Dale took the king of clubs and it occurred to him that it would be very convenient for his side if Mr. Heinste had to lead spades from the board.

Accordingly, he now led a diamond and dummy was in. By this time Mr. Heinste had sobered somewhat. He had two winners in his own hand in the jack of hearts and the queen of clubs, but how was he to reach them?

AFTER winning with dummy's ace of diamonds, he led a small spade toward his queen. Mr. Abel played the nine. Mr. Heinste thought a long time and finally let the nine hold. Mr. Abel then led another diamond and again dummy was in. At this point there was nothing to do but cash the rest of the diamonds and give Mr. Dale a spade trick on the end. Down one.

Mr. Heinste's timing was pitifully faulty. All he had to do was to pick up all of the defenders' diamonds first—then knock out the ace of hearts. Playing in this fashion, nothing could have stopped three or four.

As the result was being scored Mr. Dale remarked: "Heinste, you are my favorite declarer and I think any defender would share my opinion."

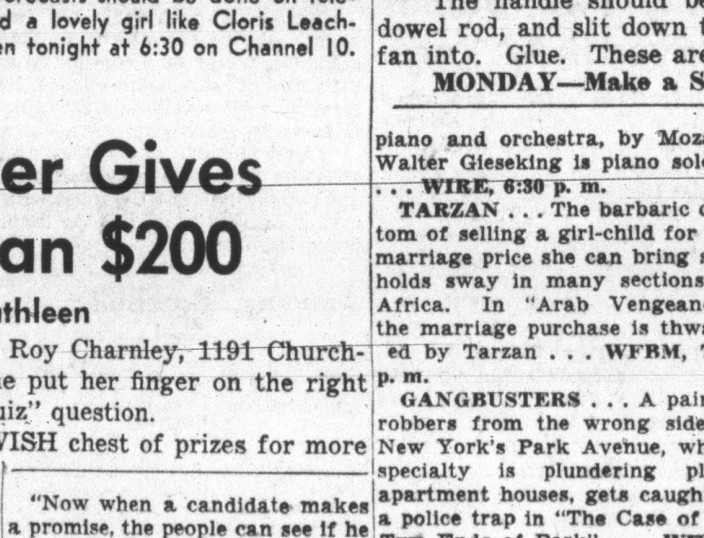

States Seek to Cut Prison Population

CHICAGO (UP)—Eleven mid-western states will study the formation of a presentence clinic designed to help judges put fewer persons in prison and more on probation.

The Central States Corrections Association recommended that its members in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio and Wisconsin develop the plan as originated in Kentucky.

The Kentucky plan called for a presentence clinic panel composed of a physician, a social worker, a recreation director and two ministers. Each person convicted is sent to the clinic.

The recommendations are advisory only and the judge may ignore them.
