HAVERFORD, Pa., July 19—Seventeen-year-old Maureen Connolly, who makes a practice of collecting tennis titles, was heavily-favored to defeat Mrs. Bunny Harshaw Vosters of Philadelphia today for the women's Pennsylvania and Eastern states crown.

A victory at Merion Cricket Club would give the "Little Mo" from San Diego, Cal., her third straight championship here and would add to the U. S. and Wimbledon titles she already owns.

Miss Connolly, although her game slipped a trifle, moved into the finals Sunday when she plays fourth-ranked Gardner Mulloy of Coral Gables, Fla., today in the upper bracket.

In the lower division, Billy Talbert of New York, the No. 2 man, seeking to become the first three-time winner in the history of the meet, will play second-seeded Art Larsen, a tough southpaw from San Leandro, Cal.
