'People Return Pastor's Love'

"The church people will love their pastor if he loves them."

Now then, doesn't that sound proper and prim?

But please don't think a newspaper reporter is trying to patronize the clergy. Far from it.

I am quoting the philosophy of the new Methodist District Superintendent, Dr. Charles T. Alexander.

I dropped in Dr. Alexander's office in the Underwriter's building to get better acquainted and see what some of his plans are for the district.

He was named to his position of authority during the recent sessions of the Indiana Conference. He succeeded that well-known and civic-minded gentleman of the cloth, Dr. Sumner L. Martin.

Dr. Alexander is 54, a substantial looking citizen. He is young enough to have endless energy and old enough to have mature judgment, genial and warm-hearted.

World War I Veteran
He was a student at DePauw when World War I broke. He enlisted in the regular Army and went overseas. When the armistice came, he re-entered college, was graduated and went on to Boston University School of Theology.

He laughed as he told of his financial problems in the seminary.

"I went completely broke," he recalled. "But I got a position as assistant pastor of a Congregational Church. And I finished with \$400 in my pocket and a ticket back West."

Among other achievements, he converted Mrs. Alexander to Methodism. She was a young organist in the Presbyterian Church when he persuaded her to accept the title, "Mrs." and exchange her Calvinistic loyalties for the Methodist Church.

Dr. Alexander enjoys good music, collects records. He loves to swim. Nothing gives him more pleasure than to go to New England for a vacation and spend a lot of time in the ocean. He also is very fond of golf and never drives his car if he possibly can walk to his destination.

Functions Like Bishop
But best of all, he is a dedicated parson, God's man, who loves to share his experience with younger ministers. And that is one of the things he most looks forward to as the new head of this district. For the superintendent functions very like a bishop, you know, only in a smaller area.

Before Dr. Alexander was named district superintendent, Bishop Richard C. Raines of the Indiana area, telephoned Mrs. Alexander and asked if she

thought her husband was physically equal to the increased duties. She was sure he was. And events took shape as recorded.

There was a serious reason for the bishop's inquiry. Dr. Alexander worked so hard some years ago, as minister of the Roberts Park Church, that he developed an ailment. The church made him the Methodist Hospital's first full-time chaplain to give him time to recover.

The new superintendent also has been pastor of the Capitol Avenue Church and came here from the office of superintendent of the Vincennes District.

Heads 55 Churches
He now heads about 55 churches and 66 ministers of Indianapolis and the community. All business matters of the district come under his jurisdiction. He will promote the building of much-needed churches in new residential sections and stress evangelism along with his denomination.

He and Mrs. Alexander have one child, Charles Jr., in the Army and stationed in Washington, D. C. He and his wife are visiting the parents now. In 1953, the son hopes to begin following in paternal footsteps, to enter Boston University School of Theology.

The Alexanders, like various other newcomers to the city, are eagerly seeking a house to buy or to rent. Temporarily, they are occupying the residence of Mrs. John F. Edwards, 4335 N. Pennsylvania St.

Reliving in retrospect his years in the ministry, Dr. Alexander told me: "One lesson I've learned—if the minister loves his people, they will love him."

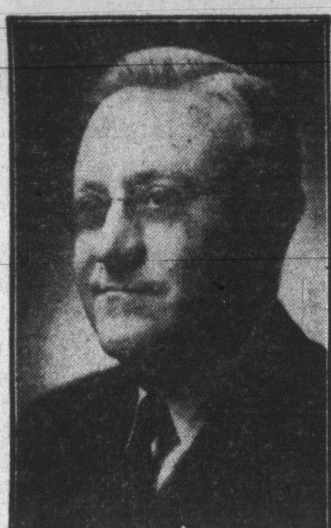

INDIANA EUB Conference Will Open Here Tuesday

Representatives of 47,000 members of Evangelical United Brethren Churches will meet for the Indiana Conference South Tuesday through Friday at Indiana Central College.

Bishop J. Balmer Showers of Indianapolis will preside at the sessions. Dr. I. Lynd Esch, one of the headline speakers and president of the college, and Dr. Robert E. Cramer, minister of the University Heights EUB Church, will be convention hosts.

The conference will open with a Holy Communion Service at 9:30 a. m. and close with the assignment of ministers Friday night.

Dr. K. K. Merryman, Indianapolis, and Dr. E. C. Brandenburg, Bedford, are conference superintendents.

A popular meeting is scheduled for each evening and business sessions and reports for the day-time sessions.

The Indiana Conference South covers all of the state south from Marion and the entire width of Indiana. It includes 303 churches, nearly 300 ministers and is the second largest conference of the EUB denomination.

Bishop Showers will officiate at the Communion with the assistance of superintendents and group leaders. Dr. V. G. Hunt, Lebanon, O., former Indianapolis resident, will speak on "Our Homes" Tuesday afternoon.

Other highlights of the meeting include an address by Dr. H. R. Heininger, president of the Evangelical Theological Seminary, Naperville, Ill., Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. and on "Our Seminaries," Thursday morning; and Dr. Reuben H. Mueller, also a former Indianapolis resident now of Dayton, on "Christian Education," Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Ralph L. Holland, general secretary of the (interdenominational) Indiana Council of Churches with headquarters here, will speak also on Thursday afternoon. Dr. Mueller will give the main address that night. President Esch is scheduled to talk about Indiana Central Friday morning.

Bishop Showers will preach the sermon for the closing worship service Friday night. New ministers there will be ordained; probationers will receive certificates; and pastors will hear their assignments. The conference will adjourn for another year with the hymn:
