

Marines Riddle Four Red Assaults

Rain Gives
GIs Rest on
Bunker Hill

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 14—Victorious American Marines, who hurled back four Chinese Communist counterattacks, and crippled a Red regiment, planted a torn and battle-stained flag dedicated to St. Michael the Archangel on Bunker Hill today.

Heavy rain turned the Bunker Hill battlefield to mud. But it was a welcome sight to the dirty, tired Leathernecks who for the past three days fought and defeated 2800 veteran Red troops in scorching heat.

The flag had been made by Korean orphans and given to the Marines. In the Catholic Church, St. Michael is the patron saint of Warriors.

Cut Reds to Pieces

The Chinese Reds made their third counterattack on the hill five miles east of Panmunjom last night. Allied artillery and sharp-shooting fire from infantrymen's rifles, mortars and machine guns cut the Communist battalion to pieces.

For more than an hour, the fanatic Reds tried to storm the position from pre-fabricated bunkers. A few Communists reached the crest and briefly engaged the Marines in hand-to-hand combat.

Chinese Retreat

Finally, the Chinese withdrew and for four hours the Marines had a brief rest. Then came the fourth counterattack, a half-hour attack that was driven off four minutes after it started.

"They didn't have much stomach for the second try," a Marine said.

An 8th Army briefing officer said that Communist "regimental strength has been invested in the action" against Bunker Hill.

Chinese Communists tossed probing attacks at the Marine western front lines, one only a mile east of Panmunjom. All were repulsed.

Reds Blast Allies
Despite Apologies

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Aug. 14 (UPI)—The Communist Peiping radio said today United Nations apologies for violating the Panmunjom neutral zone were "worthless" and insisted Allied planes were ordered to enter the conflict area.

The Communist broadcast also said the United Nations admitted shelling the zone Aug. 3 only because "no evidence made them yield at last."
