

Extra Session Aid to GOP, Bray Says

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—At least one Hoosier congressman wouldn't mind coming back to work here right now.

Freshman Rep. William O. Bray, Martinsville Republican, said today he hopes President Truman carries out his threat to call the 82d Congress back into session to deal with inflation.

"That would be the best break we Republicans could have," Mr. Bray said, just before flying back to Indiana.

"It would give us a chance to point out the fact that Truman himself is the greatest inflationist of all. His giving steel prices a \$5.65 per ton price increase, in order to settle the 54-day strike, can't be matched by anything else that has happened to cause prices to continue to increase."

"I want him to call us back here. Let's debate the whole subject. Then the people will know who is to blame for the high cost of living."

President Truman was so proud of his steel strike settlement that he sent a message from the White House to the Democratic convention in Chicago July 24. Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn (D. Tex.), convention chairman, read it to the cheering delegates.

The strike, which the Democratic vice presidential nominee, Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama, admits was mishandled by the Administration, caused an estimated \$4 billion production loss in the United States.

Mr. Bray thinks foreign policy, however, will be the basis for the campaign debates between his party and the Democrats.

"We have seen American prestige abroad sink to new lows," he said. "Our citizens in foreign countries have been subjected to great indignities."

Refers to Oatis

He had in mind the long imprisonment of Hoosier newsman William Oatis in Czechoslovakia and not the recent Stockholm episode involving Margaret Truman. Mr. Bray hastened to explain.

"We have watched as our foreign policy seems to vacillate, hesitate, and backtrack," Mr. Bray continued. "We have wondered if we have a real policy at all. Nations friendly to us have been treated shabbily, and our enemies often have received favors."

"For these reasons, and many more, the American people are examining our international relations. More important than recounting the errors of the past and fixing the responsibility for them is the attempt to learn from our mistakes and plot a course in the future which will avoid similar pitfalls."

Louis to Star In Film Based On Life Story

NEW YORK Aug. 22 (UPI)—Joe Louis, former world heavyweight champion, will make a movie based on his life and he's not at all worried about competing against seasoned actors.

"Well," he drawled yesterday when asked if he would not feel overshadowed by the famous actors who may take part. "I can't act—but they can't fight."

In "The Joe Louis Story" Lena Horne has been mentioned for the part of Joe's wife, and Duke Ellington may do an original score.

Louis will play himself in fight sequences, with a professional actor, not yet chosen, to portray him in the rest of the film.

LOUIS, who now weighs 230 pounds, was asked if he thought he was in shape to attempt such a rigorous schedule again.

"No," the deadpan ex-champion said. "I ain't in fighting shape but neither are they."

He plans to lose at least 10 pounds by going into training for a month before the picture goes into production next January.

"And," Joe said to Stirling Silliphant, the producer. "You've gotta do somethin' about this." He rubbed the bald spot on his head.

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
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
