# Ike Motorcade Goes Wrong Way to Get to Right Place

IT WAS the "wrong way" motorcade for the Ike bandwagon today. The route of the motorcade from Weir Cook Municipal Airport went east on Michigan St. from Indiana Ave. to Alabama St. Michigan St. is one-way WEST. Police had to block off that area of Michigan St. at the time of the parade.

GEN. EISENHOWER was greeted here today by the 5-year-old son of a former member of Ike's staff.

Dwight Eisenhower Lee, son of Ernest Lee, 7913 Ridge Rd., swapped handshakes with his father's ex-boss and Mr. Lee swapped World War II yarns with the General.

Mr. Lee was a colonel on Gen. Eisenhower's staff at SHAEP, serving as Ike's personal aid for four years. He joined the General when Ike took command of the 3d Army at San Antonio in 1940.

Mr. Lee now is vice president and member of the board of directors of Morris Plan.

NO TICKETS needed for Ike speech at Fieldhouse tonight. But last night a jeep circulated the downtown area with pretty girls handing out "complimentary tickets" to the big event. If you received one, don't rely on getting in late. It's still "first come, first served," the rally planners said.

MRS. ROSE PAKULA, 3174 N. Delaware St., today sought to meet Gen. Eisenhower for the second time. She first met the General at a DP camp in Germany in 1945.

## Ike Saluted By 'Taftland'

General Arrives For Rally Here

Indianapolis, he would ask all voters to support the Republican team.

He reminded that he has expressed, time and again, his admiration for Gen. Marshall and his disagreement with those who infer that his one-time Army colleague was a "front man for traitors."

A motorcade, led by 14 motorcycle police and a dozen city, state and county patrol cars, escorted the General downtown.

The motorcade had all the formality, glitter and pomp of a military parade. It stretched out over a mile. There were more than 100 cars in line behind Ike.

Right at Home

Ike seemed instantly at home. He waved to the crowds and to the boys and girls who lined the route screaming "We Like Ike." The route was not covered with banners, bunting nor buttons.

Some women expressed disappointment that Ike didn't bring his "real" chief of staff—Mrs. Eisenhower, known far and wide as "Mamie."

Officials of School 14, the Fleming Gardens institution, let the kids out of school to cheer Ike. They were the most demonstrative along the route.

Most spectators had cameras. As the long line of police cars passed, one amateur photographer shouted:

"We can see you every day. We want to see Ike."

Gets Ovation

The motorcade stopped at the Indianapolis Recorder, local weekly Negro newspaper, where an ovation was given the General.

Workers in the Marmon-Harmon, International Harvester, and Capital Paper Co. offices watched the procession go by, leaning out of plant windows.

Gen. Eisenhower freshened up in his suite in the Claypool Hotel and later addressed a noon luncheon of the Indiana Republican Editorial Association.

Sen. Jenner and Mr. Craig also spoke.

Top Republican leaders voiced hopes that during his one-day stay here Ike will lash out at the Democratic rival, Adlai Stevenson, who was nominated for President by Indiana's Gov. Schricker.

Gen. Eisenhower's visit to Indiana was regarded as significant because:

MEANS NOTHING—Local Ike leaders were chagrined when national Ike committeemen distributed these tickets downtown yesterday. The tickets mean nothing. It's still "first come, first served" for admission to the Fieldhouse for the General's speech tonight.

Ike spoke at Yom Kippur services there and Mrs. Pakula, who had just been released from Dachau concentration camp, was part of a welcoming committee for him. Mrs. Pakula and her husband have lived here for three years.

DEMOCRATS planned to greet Ike with mammoth "ADLAI" signs when he tours Windsor Village this afternoon.

SEN. WILLIAM E. JENNER rode out to greet Gen. Eisenhower at the airport today wearing a half-inch gold "Ike" monogram in his lapel.

DR. GOLDEN P. SILVER, president of the County Commissioners and a former comanager of the Taft forces here, today was sporting the latest in a series of Ike buttons he has been wearing. Complete with a sleek, long screen, proper jiggling makes the button show either a picture of Gen. Eisenhower or a "Win With Ike" slogan.

CUSTOMER in Claypool Hotel drugstore observed a prominent display of specially packaged "I like Ike" cigarettes. "Where's the other brand, for Stevenson?" he asked. The clerk didn't even bother to answer—just laughed.

"IKE IS wrecking this court," Democrat Judge Philip L. Bayt said this morning in Municipal Court 3. Four police officers failed to appear against defendants. They were on "Eisenhower detail," the police department explained.

REPUBLICAN-dominated courthouse today planned to release half of workers for Eisenhower parade, other half later in the day to go to county GOP headquarters. Courthouse parking lot, normally jammed far beyond capacity, had empty stalls this morning. Only one court had much business, calendars of other kept clean for Ike festivities.

REPUBLICAN workers in City Hall were on the job this morning, in spite of the appearance here of their national standard bearer. However,

Ohio Senator are frankly skeptical of Ike's Republican views.

TWO—Indiana was carried by New York's Gov. Thomas Dewey by a bare 19,000 majority. At stake this time will be 13 electoral votes.

To Map Battle Plans

THREE—Republicans and Democrats want to see how Ike treats Sen. Jenner. A strong stand by Gen. Eisenhower, either for or against the Indiana Senator, would doubtless affect the state Senate race.

Besides delivering a major address at the Butler Fieldhouse, Ike is scheduled to map battle plans with top GOP state leaders at the Claypool Hotel, the General's headquarters during his stop.

The five-star General will remain in Indianapolis overnight, flying to New York at 9 a. m. tomorrow.

Visit Voter Workers

Ike was scheduled to visit voter registration workers at School 57 at Ritter Ave. and Washington St. At 3 p.m., Ike has a handshaking tour set with precinct workers at Marion County Republican headquarters, 137 N. Delaware St.

No dinner has been arranged for the General's party. It is presumed Ike will dine with close associates and political advisers in his fourth floor suite in the Claypool.

At 8:15 p. m., Ike will leave for the Butler Fieldhouse. His speech will be broadcast coast to coast by the NBC and ABC radio networks. Locally, WISH and WIRE will carry it. There will be no live television of the event. The Butler rally starts at 8 p. m. with a musical program. Doors open at 6:30. No tickets are needed. There are no reserved seats. First come, first served.

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## Separate Zone Board Nearer

City Council today needs only a 5-4 margin to approve creation of a separate Board of Zoning Appeals.

Councilman J. Wesley Brown, a member of the City Plan Commission, said the ordinance would have required a 6-3 margin of more if the Plan Commission had not given its blessing yesterday.

After a public hearing, at which no one appeared to protest Mayor Clark's proposal to appoint a separate, five-man Zoning Board, the Plan Commission agreed to the idea by a vote of six to one. The 10-member commission now does double duty as a Zoning Board.

Jack B. Kammins, commission president, cast the lone dissenting vote.

Mr. Kammins said he was not opposed to separation of memberships for the two functions, but felt the new Zoning Board also should be composed of 10 members, in view of its importance.

**Driver in Fair Shape After Heart Attack**

John McClure, 52, of R. R. 11, Box 375, was in fair condition in Long Hospital today after he suffered a heart attack which resulted in a traffic collision yesterday.

According to sheriff's deputies, Mr. McClure was driving on E. 10th St. near Franklin Rd. when he lost control of his car, side-swiped a gasoline truck and ran into a ditch.

He was given first aid by the Warren Township Fire Department inhalator squad, then taken to the hospital.

Frederick L. Schultz, 26, of 522 E. Market St., knocked down two mailboxes when he swerved in an attempt to avoid the collision.

POLICE OFFICIALS assigned 200 men to special duty today for the visit of Gen. Eisenhower. Only two officers were assigned to guard the General. Local officers said they "expected" some Secret Service men will be guarding the Republican presidential candidate.

The rest of the 200 men were assigned to traffic control.

FEDERAL Grand Jury asked for permission to adjourn for the day today so jurymen could see the Eisenhower parade. District Attorney Marshall Hanley, a Democrat appointed by President Truman, agreed, in spite of a load of unfinished business still being studied by the panel.

EISENHOWER forces here obtained special permission from the Safety Board to use a sound truck on downtown streets to announce parade and talk tonight at Fieldhouse. Safety Board President Paul Robertson said agreement was violated when truck blared away on Circle between forbidden hours of 4 to 6 p. m. yesterday.

which escorted the General. Among the first to greet Gen. Eisenhower as he stepped from the plane was Sen. William E. Jenner, who stood next to the presidential candidate as dozens of press and newsreel photographers ground away.

First off the official plane came a contingent of photographers. Two lines of Marion County sheriff's deputies held the crowd back for the ceremonies. The General wore a brown hat and white suit. At the request of the photographers, he removed his hat and waved it to the crowd.

DURING the reception where Ike was greeted officially by Mayor Clark, who is acting as his host, the General was presented a bouquet of roses by Virginia Ann Johnson, Miss Indianapolis of 1950.

Dozens of state police were stationed along the route to insure a speedy trip for the six-car motorcade.

Ike's car was preceded by two police escort cars and a vehicle carrying newsreel photographers.

Along the W. Washington St. route, most other taverns were empty as customers took their glasses to the curb to watch the General.

The entire route was lined by parked cars, many of them with horns blaring as Ike went by.

of the Senate conservative GOP bloc and author of a bitter attack on Ike's old friend, Gen. George C. Marshall.

Nobody would ever confuse Ike's views with those of Mr. Jenner. But Gov. Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic candidate, has tried to make capital out of tying the two men together politically.

The General will be introduced tonight by Sen. Jenner and—as Ike said yesterday—he is supporting everyone on the Republican ticket.

As he said also—he hopes to draw support and votes from many who have differing views on various issues. But Indiana waited today for the answer to the question: Will Gen. Eisenhower plug openly for Mr. Jenner's election?

Buckling down to the hard facts of Bob Taft's strength in the Corn Belt, here's what the General is saying to Taft supporters:

"I know full well that many of you—possibly even a vast majority of you—preferred another individual for the honor and the responsibility that was finally conferred upon me.

"I would beg you never to give up a loyalty that you develop for anyone else in your party. You should never allow to disappear from your lives a loyalty that has been once born, but keep it there. You have put Sen. Taft up high and that is where you should keep him.

"The whole purpose now should be to get the leaders united at the top so that the whole organization will have the benefit of such unity. When we get all of them in a single group, we will have a total loyalty and the finest kind of loyalty we can have."

That was his plea in Illinois Friday and in Ohio yesterday. In Illinois, the signs were that he had gone a long way toward healing the wounds of the battle at Chicago.

Ike made some headway in Ohio, too. There, many GOP organization leaders seem earnestly ready to work hard for him. But it's going to take some solid word from Mr. Taft himself before many of his personal followers pitch in.
