

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.
Gov. McMullen of W. T. is here; he says the Indians west of the Cascade mountains were friendly, but it was feared they might be influenced by those east of the mountains who defeated Steptoe. A vigorous campaign against them will, however, probably produce a general peace among the savages. The Indians from the British Russian possessions are in the habit of plundering and killing settlers in the most exposed portions of the Territory, Gov. McMullen says.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.
Com. Page will serve upon Commodore Shubrick as fleet commander in the Paraguay expedition.
The Government having been officially advised of the landing of the captured slaves taken on board the Brig Echo, has telegraphed to have them removed to Fort Sumpter. Arrangements will be made to restore them to their native land. Twelve of the slaves have died since the capture of the vessel, which was in an extremely filthy and unsafe condition.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 30.
At 12 o'clock last night a fire occurred in the cellar of Dr. Harris's drug store, slightly damaging the building. Harris lost \$7,000; insured for \$5,000.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 30.
The deaths from yellow fever Saturday were 57; total for the week, 402.

Boston has a population of 162,940. Like many other cities its numbers have not increased for a year past, but, if anything, diminished. The assessors make a report, showing a decrease of 574, which would indicate a considerable loss of population—say 2,500.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 1.
Butter.—The receipts are light, and sell readily at 13 1/4 for prime, and 13 1/2 for choice, in good order for the city trade.

Corn.—The sales during the week add up 13 1/2 for fair to good Rio, and 12 1/2 for prime, the latter rate for very choice in small parcels.

Chickens.—There has been a good demand during the week, and with moderate supplies prices have ruled firm at 70 for prime selected, and 72 for extra large.

Corn.—There is a good demand for flour barrels at 30 to 35; whiskey barrels dull at 50 to 60; pork barrels \$1.

Cattle.—The receipts are very light, and are generally of an inferior quality, and prices must be regarded as nominal. Except for a prime article, there is no fair demand. We quote bell poles \$1.50; bell staves \$2.10.

Fruit.—Some small lots of lemons have been received, and sell readily at 75¢ per box. Oranges very scarce, and prices nominal at 25¢ per box. Raisins are steady at 25¢ to 35¢ per box for M. R. and Layer \$3.25 to \$3.50. The market for dried is steady, with a fair demand at 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 for apples, and 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 for peaches.

Butter.—The receipts are moderate, and sell readily at 42¢.

Flour.—There is a decline; \$1.60 to 1.75 for good to choice superfine, and 1.50 to 1.65 for choice extra white.

Corn.—A good steady demand and prices have been well sustained, the market closing firm at 13 1/2 for prime new white; 13 1/4 for 1st prime new red.

Hay.—The market is steady with a good demand at \$1.12 1/2 per ton for prime. Common grades 1 1/2 to 2, and dull.

Hides.—We quote flint at 13 1/4; dry salted 11 1/2; green salted 11 1/4, and green at 6¢.

Pork.—There is a good demand, and prices are 50¢ higher. Prime hams at 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 per barrel. A sale of 100 at 12 1/2.

At Louisville, on the 1st. Flour was selling at 14 1/2 to 15; Corn 50; Hay \$13 to \$14 per ton.
