

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.
Gov. McMullen of W. T. is here, he says the Indians west of the Cascade mountains were friendly, but it was feared they might be influenced by those east of the mountains who defeated Steptoe. A vigorous campaign against them and a severe chastisement will, however, probably produce a general peace among the savages. The Indians from the British Russian possessions are in the habit of plundering and killing settlers in the most exposed portions of the Territory, Gov. McMullen says.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.
Com. Page will serve under Commodore Slubrick as fleet commander in the Paraguay expedition.

The Government having been officially advised of the landing of the captured slaves taken on board the Brig Echo, has telegraphed to have them removed to Fort Sumpter. Arrangements will be made to restore them to their native land. Twelve of the slaves have died since the capture of the vessel, which was in an extremely filthy and unsafe condition.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 30.
At 12 o'clock last night a fire occurred in the cellar of Dr. Harris's drug store, slightly damaging the building. Harris lost \$7,000; insured for \$5,000.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 30.
The deaths from yellow fever Saturday were 57; total for the week, 402.

BOSTON has a population of 162,940. Like many other cities its numbers have not increased for a year past, but, if anything, diminished. The assessors make a report, showing a decrease of polls of 574, which would indicate a considerable loss of population—say 2,500.

Hay, per ton \$10-\$12; Wheat, per bu. 75 to 90; Oats 40; Corn 45; Butter per lb. 12¢; Eggs, per dozen 6¢; Onions, per bu. 40; Sets \$12-\$15; Chickens, per dozen \$1.50-\$1.75; Lard 10¢; Apples 50 to 75; Potatoes 50 to 75.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 1.
BUTTER.—The receipts are light, and ready at 13a14¢ for prime, and 15a16¢ for choice, in good order for the city trade.

CORRUGATE.—The sales during the week add up 4375 bags at 11a12¢ per fair to good Rio, and 12a13¢ per prime, the latter rate for very choice in small parcels.

CURRANT.—There has been a good demand during the week, and with moderate supplies have rated firm at 10¢ per prime selected, and 12¢ for extra large.

COOKSTUFF.—There is a good demand for flour barrels at 38 to 40¢; whiskey barrels at 55a56¢; pork barrels 81.

COOKSTUFF.—The receipts are very light, and are generally of an inferior quality, and prices must be regarded as nominal, except for a prime article, which is in fair demand. We quote bbl. pones \$3 60a7; bbl. staves \$3 90a.

CUTTERS.—Some small lots of Lemons have been received, and sold ready at 7a88 per box. Oranges very scarce, and prices nominal at \$2 90 per box. Raisins are steady at \$2 50 a2 75 per box for M. R., and Layer \$3 25a \$3 50. The market for Dried is steady, with a fair demand at \$1 75a2 00 for Apples, and \$1 50a55 for Peaches.

FEATHERS.—The receipts are moderate, and sell ready at 42¢.

FLOUR.—There is a decliner \$1 60a7 a2 76 for good to choice superfine, and \$1 40a55 a2 25 for choice extra white wheat.

GRAIN.—A good steady demand and prices have been well sustained, the market closing firm at \$1 13a15 for prime new white; \$1 10a12 for prime new red.

HAY.—The market is steady with a good demand of \$1 12a14 per ton for prime. Common grades \$1 08a10 and dull.

HIDES.—We quote skin at 13a14¢ dry salted 11a12¢; green salted 61a7¢, and green at 6¢.

POTATOES.—There is a good demand, and prices are steady. Prime Potatoes at \$3 60c. A bushel. A sale of 100 bushels at \$3 60c.

At Louisville, on the 1st, Flour was selling at \$4 75 to \$5; Corn 50c; Hay \$13 to \$14 per ton.
