War with Spain.

We are informed that capt. Bid-
dle is appointed to the command
of the U. States ship Ontario, now
at N. York, and will sail shortly
for the coast of South America.
Capt. Downes, late of the Ontario
is appointed to the command of
the Java. We also learn from the
same source, that a war with
Spain is extremely probable.

the news that Mr. Bourne, consul
of the U. States at Amsterdam,
died suddenly on the 26th of A-
pril.

The British vessel Angelica,
