THE following constitution for a
MORAL society, was adopted
at a meeting of the members
sometime last winter, but the
publication thereof has from
various causes been postponed
until the present time.—

It is requested that all persons
who have hitherto become
members, and also all who wish
to join the society, would meet
in Madison, at Major Henry
Ristine's on the second Monday
in August next, for the
purpose of making further reg-
ulations relative to the said in-
stitution.

BEING fully persuaded of the
truth of that text of sacred writ
which declares "That righteousness
exalteth a nation," and that
"Sin is a reproach to any people,"
and knowing that it is the duty
of every friend of man, as well as
Christian, to endeavor to suppress
vice, and promote the interests of
morality, and good order; and
being sensible that concert, and
united influence, will be necessary
for carrying into effect, such de-
sirable objects; We therefore agree
to unite ourselves together,
into a Moral association, for the
purpose of promoting morality,
and using our individual exer-
cises, to suppress vicious exam-
ples, by bringing the guilty under
the notice of those laws of our
state, which respect vice and im-
morality.

Rule 1st. Each member of this
association, shall use his influence
to promote the general objects of
this institution, viz. the suppression
of vice of every kind, and
promotion of virtue and morality
in general.

Rule 2nd. Each member shall
use his influence, both by precept
and example, to inculcate the ne-
cessity of good morals to the
order and peace of society, & the
stability of civil institution.

Rule 3rd. The association shall
appoint yearly, a standing com-
mittee of seven at least of their
members, whose business it shall
be at each stated meeting, to
make report of the prosecutions
for immoral conduct, and give an
account of the state of morals
within their knowledge.

Rule 4th. The members of this
association shall meet yearly on
the first Monday in March, for
the purpose of electing the respec-
tive officers of the society, and to
concert such measures, and adopt
such resolutions as will be judged
expedient for the further promo-
ting the objects of the institution.

Rule 5th. There shall be ap-
pointed, as the standing officers
of the society for each year, a
Chairman, Secretary, and Treas-
urer, who shall continue in office
until their successors are elected—
It shall be the duty of the chair-
man, to keep and preserve good
order in the society, and to do
all other duties of his office which
may be pointed out by the laws
of the association. The secretary
shall record the proceedings of
the society, and shall have the
care of the records, and keep a
fair and just account of all
monies paid to the treasurer by
the society.—It shall be the duty
of the treasurer to pay out the

money according to the direc-
tions of the society.

Rule 6th. The society shall in
addition to the general annual
meeting provided for in the 4th
rule of this constitution, have a
quarter annual meeting, & more-
over, the standing committee
shall have it in their power, if
they conceive it necessary, to call
an extraordinary meeting of the
members of this association, by
giving public notice thereof in
the public prints, two weeks pre-
vious to such meeting.

Rule 7th. No person shall be,
or continue a member of this asso-
ciation, who is not at least moral
in his own conduct—But all moral
characters shall be willingly re-
ceived as members.

Rule 8th. All gambling, bre-
aches of the peace, Sabbath-
breaking, profane swearing, dis-
orderly taverns; and every spe-
cies of immorality, cognizable by
the laws of this state, shall be the
subject of animadversion and re-
proof; and if any person guilty
of such immorality, shall prove
refractory, after due admonition
being given, (if such admonition
be thought necessary) any mem-
ber of this association under whose
notice it shall happen, shall take
due steps to have such person
brought under the notice of the
civil authority, and punished ac-
cordingly.

Rule 9th. Any member of
this association who shall neglect
his duty, shall be dealt with by
the society.

Rule 10th. This association
shall have full power to adopt
such by-laws as may be necessary
for regulating the proceedings
therein, provided, such by-laws
are not in opposition to this con-
stitution.

Rule 11th. Each and every
member of this society shall be
bound to pay the treasurer there-
of, at least once a year, such sum
of money as shall be deemed ne-
cessary, by a vote of the majori-
ty of the members present at such
meeting, for defraying the expen-
ses of the institution.

Rule 12th. This constitution
shall be published in the "Indiana
Republican" for three weeks in
succession, after which time the
members of the society will be
bound to attend to the objects of
the institution.

Rule 13th. No article or rule
in this constitution shall be altered,
changed, or amended, without
the concurring voice of a majority
of all the members: nor is any
person to be removed from mem-
bership in this association, with-
out the concurrence of two-thirds
of the members present—nor
shall he withdraw himself from
the society (having incurred cen-
sure,) unless he has underwent a
trial for his misconduct.
