

of those on the Arkansas and
the rivers, including all those
on the east side of the Mississippi,
on taking the enumeration,
express a wish to remove
—and that after the enu-
meration is taken, the Cherokee
shall cede to the United
States, such portion of their coun-
try as those who reside on the
Arkansas and White rivers, to-
gether with all those who may
wish to remove, are justly entitled
to their numbers: for which the
United States are to give them
an equal portion of land on the
Arkansas and White rivers—the
lands of which are designated in
the present treaty.

Those that make their election
to move, are to be furnished
with boats and supplies necessary
for their removal, at the expence
of the United States; each indi-
vidual of the poor Indians to be
furnished with a rifle gun, a blan-
ket, a kettle, or steel trap. There
are reserves of 640 acres al-
located to heads of families, in the
portion of country given up to the
United States, should the indivi-
duals reside thereon until his or
her death, which will descend to
posterity in fee simple, but
if they leave their reserva-
tion during their life time, such
land will become the property of
the government. A reasonable
compensation is to be made to
the Indians whose leave plantations,
and their improvements.

Another Prophet.—A dwarf na-

twenty-five years of unrivalled

time (last winter) Bonaparte, in

again become Emperor of France.
