2000. The remaining 34,00 are  
thought to be distributed as fol-  
lows: In the hands of the Bakers,  
3000—In that of the merchants,  
31,000—Of which overwhelm-  
ing stock 23,000 has been receiv-  
ed since the 1st of the month—  
an unprecedented quantity for  
this season of the year; three-  
fourths of which must inevitably  
spoil if not shortly exported, of  
which we see little or no prospect.  
There is no demand whatever for  
it, except for our daily consump-  
tion, which may amount at this  
season of the year to about 100  
barrels. Some sales of shipping  
Flour have been effected at 8 dol-  
lars per barrel, and before two  
weeks (if it is at all forced upon  
the market) we fear it will be re-  
duced still lower. We are retail-  
ing best Bakers flour at from 9 to  
10 dollars.

**Pork.**—This article, although  
scarce, is not in very brisk demand  
at our quotations. The qualities  
now on hand are not good, and  
have been badly put up. Great  
pains ought to be taken with this  
article, while nine times out of  
ten it would pay well for the trou-  
ble.

**Lard.**—This article has got up  
to 22 cents for prime quality;  
while that badly handled and thin  
will not bring 13 cents. Here  
then is a striking instance where  
the careful man is amply rewarded  
for his trouble.

**Hams and Bacon.**—Have declin-  
ed, owing to an immense quan-  
tity arriving, and the lateness of  
the season. These articles should  
never come here later than April.

**Whiskey.**—Is dull at 75 cents per  
gallon, although it is not very  
plenty, but in consequence of a  
fall in the price of common rum.

**Sugar.**—Of the cane crops noth-  
ing positive can yet be said. That  
remaining now on hand sells at 12  
and 14 cents, although slowly.  
The quantity remaining in the  
country is not much. Notwith-  
standing we do not apprehend any  
advance in price.

**Coffee.**—The quantity of this  
article on hand is not large; al-  
though it has not augmented in  
price; owing to the limited de-  
mand at this season.

**Wines.**—Of all descriptions are  
scarcer than they have been, al-  
though they have not advanced in  
price. A small addition to the  
stock on hand would make them  
decline.

**Brandy & Jamaica Rum.**—Have  
fallen and are now quite plenty.  
The former 2dolls. & 2, 75 cts.  
per gallon; the latter 1 doll. a 1  
50 cts. per gallon: 1 doll. 25 a 1  
50 cts. per gallon, 4th proof.

**Cotton.**—Has been on the decline,  
and there is little or no demand  
for it at our present quotations;  
but as every thing depends on the  
quality of this article, the plant-  
ers cannot be too careful, and are  
now amply rewarded for their care  
and attention by the great differ-  
ence made in the price. We have  
ascertained that 50,000 bales have  
been shipped since the commence-  
ment of the season, including all  
descriptions and from all quarters.  
There are said to be about 5000

bales of 2nd, 3d, and 4th quali-  
ties, still remaining on hand, in-  
cluding some prime in the hands  
of speculators.
