The semi annual election of Representatives took place Tuesday; and we have the pleasure to announce an increase of republican strength in the State. West Greenwich, Littleton, Bristol and Warren, so far changed their representation as to give an accession to the Republican members, leaving the federal majority in the State but two. Should there be no other favorable changes in the towns yet to be heard from, the triumph will be complete, the Governor and Senate being already unanimously Republican. UNITED STATES' BANK.

The Scioto Gazette says the directors of the United States' Bank at Philadelphia, have determined to establish a branch of that institution at Chillicothe; and one at Chillicothe, Ky.

The following collection of a few of the many curious punishments inflicted for various offences, is copied from the old records of Massachusetts, between the years 1630 and 1650.

"Sir Richard Saltonsal, fined four bushels of malt for his absence from the court.

"Josias Plastow shall, for stealing 4 baskets of corn from the Indians, return 8 baskets again, be fined 5*l.* and hereafter be called Josias, and not Mr. as he used to be.

"Joyce Bradwick shall give unto Alexander Becks 20 shillings, for promising him marriage, without her friends' consent, and now refusing to perform the same.

"Thomas Peter, for suspicion of slander, idleness and stubbornness, is to be severely whipt and kept in hold.

"Richard Turner, for being notoriously drunk, was fined 2*l.*

"Edward Palmer, for his extortion, taking 33*s.* 7*d.* for the plank and work of Boston stocks, is fined 5*l.* and censured to be set an hour in the stocks.

"John White is bound in 10*l.* to be of good behaviour, and not to come into the company of his neighbor Thomas Bull's wife alone."—*Nat. Int.*

Mr. John Hall, of Portland, has invented a *patent rifle*, superior to the common rifle in the accuracy with which it throws a ball, and in the ease and quickness with which it can be loaded. The load is put in, not at the muzzle, but at the chamber, by means of a joint above the breach. Neither ramrod nor patch is used. The patent rifle can be loaded and fired five or six times, while the common rifle is loaded and fired once. The government has determined to introduce this improved rifle into the army.

The most important information received by the Julius Caesar, arrived at New York on the 2d inst. from Liverpool, is the report of the league entered into by Russia, to assist Spain in the subjection of her revolted colonies in South America; and that she has engaged to support the cause of Ferdinand on this continent, with a squadron including 6 ships of the line, and an army of from 15 to 20,000 men. This pledge on the part of Russia is said to have been made "in consideration of the cession of Old & New California, the island of Minorca," & the resignation of certain commercial advantages to her by Spain.
