The local money market remains quiet and without any noticeable features. Rates of interest continue at 8@10 per cent.

COMMERCIAL.

There was no improvement noticeable in the local merchandise markets to-day. Business moves sluggishly in all lines. Receipts of wheat are liberal, and offerings of spot and early delivery are large, meeting an active milling and shipping demand for all wheat that will grade. Receipts from Illinois are in bad condition, damp and hot. The market is becoming glutted with rejected and unmerchantable, and will sell lower. The market for corn is quiet but strong, and values are a shade higher. The offerings are small and the bulk of the receipts, chiefly Illinois product, is hot and sour. Oats are scarce and nominal. Provisions are easy and a little weaker, but generally holders are not pressing stocks at quotations. The demand for flour is light and there is a tendency toward easier prices. Groceries are quiet but all kinds of staple goods are sold firm. Country produce is weak and the demand is light.

Fresh fruits—few receipts the market is dull and heavy. Owing to hot weather the arrivals are generally in unsalable condition, and many have to be thrown away. The freshest are barely valuable. We quote per dozen, less 25@.
