TAFT AND SHERMAN CORRAL THE BALLOTS

G. O. P. Gets States that Count Most and Majority Electoral Votes.

SOLID SOUTH STILL SOLID

Only That Maryland Looks Like Making a Break-away.

NEW YORK CITY'S SURPRISE

Old Town Gives the Republican Ticket a Plurality.

New York, Nov. 4.—The next president of the United States will be William Howard Taft, Republican, of Ohio. The next vice president will be James Schoolcraft Sherman, Republican, of New York.

This is the verdict returned by the majority of the 15,000,000 voters of the United States. The Republican candidate nearly repeats Mr. Roosevelt's feat of carrying every northern state, giving him a clear majority in the electoral college of 113 over William Jennings Bryan, the Democratic candidate. Mr. Taft will receive 298 electoral votes to Mr. Bryan 186. The latter has carried West Virginia, which



went to Mr. Roosevelt four years ago, and perhaps Nebraska, and may have won back the one electoral vote which Maryland gave to the Republican candidate in 1900. Oklahoma, the state created since the last presidential election, has enrolled itself, as was expected, in the Democratic column. New York city has given Taft a plurality, the first time a Republican presidential candidate has been so favored since 1896.

TAFT ELECTED PRESIDENT OVER BRYAN

ILLINOIS RE-ELECTS DENEEN

Indiana Goes For The Ohioan By a Reduced Majority.

Ohio Lines Up For Her Native Son and Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin Follow For the Ohioan.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Illinois has been carried by the Republican party by a plurality of 170,000, giving the state's twenty-seven electoral votes to Taft and Sherman. The state Republican ticket has also been successful. Governor Charles S. Deneen winning from former Vice President Adlai E. Stevenson by the same plurality. Chicago has gone Democratic by 25,000, reversing the result in 1904, when Roosevelt carried Cook county by 226,086.

Result as to Congress.

The lower house of the Sixty-first congress will be Republican by about the same majority. Speaker Cannon has won his fight for re-election, but by a reduced majority.

NUTMEG STATE IS FOR TAFT

Plurality, Compared With Roosevelt's, is Increased.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 4.—Despite the efforts made to place Connecticut in the Democratic column, the state has given its vote to the Republican candidate. Mr. Taft's majority has also gone above that of Mr. Roosevelt four years ago. In that year the Re-



publican candidate carried the state 38,180. This year Mr. Taft's majori-

ty is 38,450.

Congressman Liley has been elected governor by 16,004 despite the opposition to him on account of the submarine boat matter and the opposition to him in his own party. Five Republican congressmen have been elected, and the state legislature will be strongly Republican.

The leaders of both parties in the state expressed great interest in the growth of the Socialist vote, which increased from 2,932 in 1906 to 5,250 this year.
