**Congressional Convention.** The Convention at Shoals on Wednesday was a very large one, probably 2,500 people being in attendance, every county being largely represented. Hon. John H. O'Neal, of Daviess, was chairman of the Congressional Convention, and Hon. Thomas R. Cobb, was nominated for re-election by acclamation, an endorsement by his constituents which he richly merits, and which will be ratified at the polls by an increased majority.

For State Senator, from this district, our fellow-citizen, Mr. Wm. A. Traylor, was nominated upon the fifth ballot, receiving 16 votes, to 10 for Mr. T. B. Buskirk, of Paoli.

For Judge of this Circuit, Hon. O. M. Welborn was nominated by acclamation, as was also Mr. W. H. Trippet, for Prosecutor, all opposition being withdrawn before a ballot was had, both worthy gentlemen whom all parties can heartily support.

Hon. D. W. Voorhees delivered one of his eloquent speeches, endearing him more to the people who heard him. The Conventions were also addressed by several other gentlemen, and every thing passed off harmoniously.
