The weather for the past week has been the hottest experienced in this locality in many years, the thermometer indicating 105° in the shade on Wednesday, and close up to boiling point in the sun. The only safety for man or beast lies in not being exposed to the direct rays of the sun for any considerable length of time.

We have heard of but three deaths in this county so far from the heat; a man in Madison township was stricken down while playing and died; a boy in Ferdinand fell dead while cradling oats, and a young tinner, named Bamberger, fell from a roof in Patoka township. Several others have been seriously affected.

Numbers of horses have suffered, also. Mr. John Judy, of Ferdinand, had one to drop dead in harness from sun stroke. In St. Louis there were a hundred and fifty cases of sun stroke on Tuesday, 47 of which proved fatal. Large numbers are also reported from all other cities in this latitude, attended with greater fatality than usual.

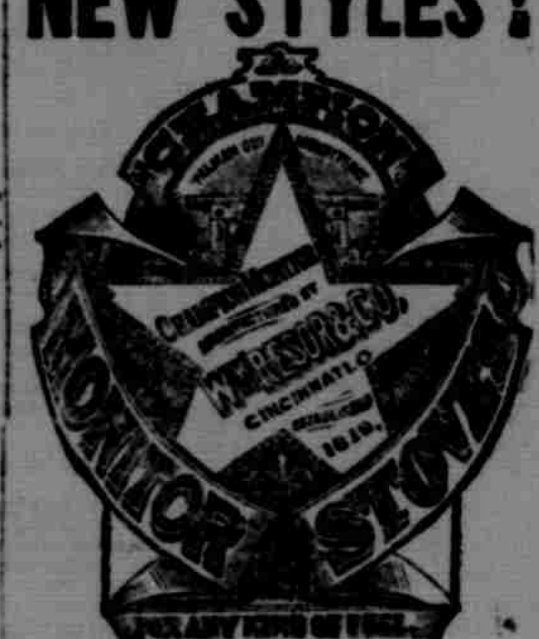
