State vs Frank Krodell and Wm Brittain, giving liquor to minor. Trial by court, finding not guilty.

State vs Jacob and John Seng, selling liquor without license. Trial by jury finding defendant Jacob Seng guilty, fine \$50; and finding John Seng not guilty.

State vs J. Seng selling liquor on Sunday. Deft pleads guilty in 10 cases. Fine in each \$10. 13 other cases of similar nature were nollied.

Rachel McCain vs George McCain divorce. Trial by court, finding for plff, granting her divorce and \$100 alimony and \$25 attorney fee.

S. A. Hobbs vs Ruth Hobbs, divorce. Trial by court, granting plaintiff divorce and custody of children.

C. P. White, et al vs Helen Bohnert et al, dismissed.

Wm Zehr vs A. W. Pfaffenberger on note, dismissed.

State vs Charles Behrens. This case is now on trial before a jury in the Dubois Circuit Court and began Monday of last week. Hon. James K. Marsh, of Jeffersonville is presiding. All of Monday was taken up in selecting the jury which is composed of the following:

The opening statement for the prosecution was made by Att'y. Hunter, who is assisting Pros Bomar Traylor. Ex-Congressman Wm. T. Zenor, of Corydon and Senator R. M. Milburn are defending Behrens. Mr. Zenor will state the cases for the defendant to the jury.

Annie Eckert vs Theodore Eckert, divorce. Trial by court finding for Plff divorce to her and custody of her four children. In the matter of the alleged insanity of Mary Theile. Trial by court finding her insane and Charles, Theile appointed guardian.

Palmer Bros. Co vs Lampert Bros. on account. Dismissed on Plff's motion.

A number of other cases were continued, dismissed or taken under advisement.

Jefferson Evans, a well-known carpenter of this place died at his residence in Jasper Monday night, Jan. 27, 1908, and was buried at Shiloh, Jan. 29, 1908, under the auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic post of this place. He was about 63 years old and his greatest pride was that he had been a good soldier in the cavalry troop of which the late Mormon Fisher was captain. The County Commissioners Office.

The most important office that the voters of the County will be called on to elect this fall election is that of County Commissioner. He is vested with all the affairs of the County and should be a competent man.

A man may be a good township trustee, he may be elected to that office and appoint a competent and efficient person as his deputy and the affairs of the township will be looked after in a careful manner, but it is vastly different with a County Commissioner, he can not be represented by deputy but MUST attend in person.

A Commissioner should have knowledge of the entire affairs of the County, should be a man of excellent judgment and should be qualified to attend to any and all of the other county officers. Every three months they are required to look over all the receipts and expenditures of the various departments of the county. The Commissioners have the supervision of the County finance they must pass on all claims submitted to them and must either allow or reject same, a commissioner should be a man of strong will power, and one who can say NO may it hurt who it will. In his official capacity he should know neither friend nor foe but be determinate, and not always have YES for an answer.

It seems to be a growing idea especially in the Northern part of the state to keep a commissioner in office as long as he strictly attends to the duties of the office. In Marion County, Commissioner Mr. Gregor is serving his fifth term, and no doubt has rendered valuable services to the citizens of that county, as he has gained that proficiency which makes him a valuable member of the board.

Under a recent act passed by the legislature the Board of Commissioners is the Board of finance of the County and must designate public depositories.

In short a Commissioner should be a all around or a handy man he should be public spirited progressive and economical.

He is well qualified and experienced for the position he is seeking and if elected will no doubt make an efficient officer. The voters will certainly make a wise selection in selecting him for their Trustee. Bainbridge Tp. Trustee drew for 1906, \$282 00 on \$28 more than in 1904.
