The well known Barber and Music Teacher Passes Away.

Last Friday morning Chas Soliga died at his residence on West Ninth Street of fever. Aged about 68 years. He was buried Sunday morning in St. Joseph's grave yard under the auspices of the C. K. of A. and St. Joseph's Society accompanied by the brass band, many of whose members learned to play under his direction. He came to Jasper from Germany about 40 years ago and opened a barber shop on the east side of the Square and continued to conduct a shop up to his death. He was for several years a school teacher in St. Joseph's school and also organist at the church and taught both brass and string music. He held the office of town treasurer for several years to the satisfaction of all. At the time of his death he was one of the Justice of Peace in Bainbridge township. His wife died some years ago. He leaves a couple of daughters, and several grand children to mourn his loss. R. I. P.

### To Hunters.

We are in receipt of the following from the game commissioners. Those who are interested can take notice.

Mr. Editor—This office is in receipt of many letters from all parts of the state inquiring concerning the open season for squirrels, and if you will publish this reply it will be of interest to all sportsmen.

Section 601 of the present game law makes it a penalty to shoot, destroy or possess any wild squirrel between November 1 of any year and the following July 1. It says nothing about the time from July 1 to November 1. Section 608 makes it unlawful to hunt any kind of game, except wild ducks and other water fowl, from October 1 to November 10. Both of these sections are in force today. The open season for squirrels is clearly limited to the time between July 1 and October 1. The only closed season for rabbits is from October 1 to November 10.

The object of this closed season is to keep the violators out of the fields that hunters who observe the law may have a fair chance at the quails November 10. The game laws are being better enforced and more respected every year.

Hunters should be careful not to go into the fields without their resident licenses, as some are paying heavy penalties for this violation.

I am putting in a number of extra deputies for October with instructions to arrest all violators of every kind.

### Postage.

You can now send a letter from San Francisco to London, over 6,000 miles, for two cents.

When Great Britain and the colonies fought in 1776 it cost four shillings to send a one ounce letter from New York to London, three shillings to Philadelphia, six shillings to Charleston. From London to Dublin an ounce letter was carried for twelve cents. When England and the United States fought again in 1812 our domestic postal rate was twenty-five cents for a distance of from 300 to 500 miles, and in England the rate varied from eight cents to forty, according to distance.

When we fought Mexico our domestic rate was five cents for less than 300 miles and ten cents for more; but the English rate had been dropped to a penny in 1840.

### Southern Railway Co.,

After Drunk Men.

Jesse T. Peck detective of the Southern Ry. Co. on Monday filed in Justice F. L. Betz, court 11 affidavits, 10 charging intoxication and one carrying concealed weapons.

Warrants were issued and delivered to Constable Joseph Hoffman on Tuesday the constable arrested Zabez Ventress of French Lick, Coon Hagen and Owen Snyder of near Crystal each of the defendants on being arraigned plead guilty to intoxication and each was assessed a fine of one dollar and costs. Ventress paid, and the other two stayed their fine.

The officials of the Southern Ry. Co., are determined to break up this obnoxious habit of being drunk while a passenger on the train.

### Suit to Set Aside Fraudulent Marriage and to Recover Real Estate.

Mathias Schmidt by his Attorney Bomar Traylor filed suit in the Dubois Circuit Court against Mary Schneider in his complaint he alleges that on the 7th day of December 1896 he and the defendant were married, that at the time of the marriage defendant represented herself to be single, while in truth and in fact she was married and had a husband named Rudolph Mathias Griesam that said Griesam is still living wherefore he ask that said marriage be set aside and that the Real Estate which he alleges he bought and which is in her name be set over to him.

It is said that the Griesam named in the complaint is now an inmate of the Dubois County Poor Asylum.

The defendant has retained Senator R. M. Milburn to look after her interest.

Collins, August Meyerholtz, James Beebe, George Schaefer and James M. Songer. The suit is filed in the circuit court here and alleges that on the 8th day of September, 1908, the defendant Schaefer unlawfully sold intoxicating liquors to her said husband, who is an habitual drunkard, until he was intoxicated, and that the said Schaefer did then and there assault her said husband knocking him down, breaking his collar bone and otherwise injuring him, so that he is unable to support his family.

### Fine Quail Hunter \$2,500 Was Trying to Dispose of 50 Birds in Closed Season

NAHVILLE—Probably the largest fines ever assessed in a magistrate's court in this state was imposed on R. F. McMurty of Sumner county, today. McMurty was arrested by a deputy game warden while attempting to dispose of fifty quail before the opening of the season in Tennessee. He was fined \$50 for each bird, making a total fine of \$2,500.—Ev. Courier.
