Forest Fires.

Forest fires which first broke out in the woods on the County poor farm about three miles south-west of Jasper, on last Thursday have been raging in that territory for several days, and doing considerable damage. Scores of farmers in that locality have been kept busy fighting the fire and ploughing furrows around their corn fields, houses and barns in order to head off the flames. Some corn was destroyed while considerable more was damaged, and a saw mill on the McCord farm was burned down, as well as also an unoccupied house on the farm of John Keilams, and several other residences and barns, among them that of Samuel H. Dillon, ex county commissioner were saved only by very hard work. On Sunday the fire reached the farm of our fellow-townsmen, John Gramelspacher, and a force of about twenty men, worked all Sunday night in order to save the large barn which Mr. Gramelspacher had recently erected, and which contained a large quantity of baled hay.

Carpenter at Huntingburg.

Hon. Harry Carpenter of Otwell, democratic candidate for prosecuting attorney of this district, addressed the Bryan and Marshall club at Huntingburg Friday night. The gle club of that city and the drum corps enlivened the occasion with good music.

Mr. Carpenter was hoarse for the first few minutes of his speech, but his voice soon cleared up and he proved to his large audience that he was one of the best campaign orators on the stump in this part of the state.

A Pipe Dream.

The following from the Liquor Dealers organ of Evansville, indicate to what extent pipe dreams can go. When Indiana secures such spotless saloons, the millennium will have passed and we all be with the blest.

A SPOTLESS SALOON

A place where men meet to enjoy themselves in a social way, not riotous debauchery, drinking more than is necessary as a stimulant. A place where men could talk art, music, literature, politics, religion, philosophy, not a place where men congregate to tell vulgar stories and display obscene pictures of women, where gambling is carried on. Not that an innocent game of cards is objectionable, where no money is at stake or drink. Played for pastime and amusement no harm can be found in this.

The spotless saloon must be kept clean and in a sanitary condition, the mugs and glasses kept clean, the beer kept cool, and not stale, low grade whiskey, say seventy or eighty proof called Blends which is poisonous and not fit to sell, wines made from acids and cigars that smell like cabbage. All this tends to hurt. The saloon run on this order is not a spotless saloon, allowing men to become half intoxicated, bawling every man who comes in for a drink. A spotless saloon is run on a purely business basis. The first thing is cleanliness, the next, pure goods and obedience to the law, eliminating every low and detestable feature, making it a public house of comfort, a place where where men come to rest and invigorate their minds and not to get drunk. Such saloons will stand and the people will stand by the men who run such places.

But on the other hand, low dives, wine rooms where young girls are debauched, poker rooms, slot machines, crap games, stale beer and poor whiskey, men drink all night and all day, no regard for law or anything else only to sell beer and whiskey. The days of such saloons are over in Indiana. The poker rooms must be eliminated from the saloon, also the wine rooms. They don't belong together and must forever separate.

What brought about the present temperance movement was poker games being run in saloons on the barroom floor where young men in some cases were allowed to pay in small limited games, and being young soon lost their heads. Their father and mothers learned this and every honest saloon-keeper was condemned in Indiana. The time is now at hand where the business must be elevated, and we are glad to state that such is the case, and while Indiana has just had the local option law passed by a fanatical legislature, the liberal element is not dead in Indiana and won't be for some time to come.

It is now the duty of every saloon man to make it a rule to run his business on business principles and be classed as a business man not as a gambler and lawbreaker. This can and must be done from now on. The general public are beginning to open their eyes. They see the improvement already and are not going to stand and see you persecuted and your property confiscated. But you must be a man and aid in putting the saloon on a clean bill and upright business standing in every community.

A University in Politics.

Josephus Daniels, chairman of the Democratic publicity bureau, commented as follows on the appearance of Prof. J. Laurence Laughlin of the University of Chicago as a stump speaker attacking the guaranty of bank deposits:

"It is not surprising," said he, "to see a professor of the University of Chicago on the stump opposing a measure so beneficial to the poor man as the guaranty of bank deposits. John D. Rockefeller and the other Standard Oil manufacturers can not be expected to favor Mr. Bryan's plans."

"Doubtless Mr. Rockefeller has communicated to the university which his money supports and has indicated that he would be gratified to have the university do effective work for the candidate he favors in this campaign."

During the course of a Republican demonstration a few days ago in a West Virginia town, when a street parade was a part of the program, a small boy was arrested for carrying an empty dinner pail. It appears that the lad had placed the pail upon a long stick which he waved along the line of march. The exhibition so incensed the feelings of the Republicans that they made complaint to the police and had the boy arrested. It appears that the full dinner pail is no longer an issue in the campaign, and that Republicans object to any reference to the empty dinner pail.

SHAKING DOWN THE TRUSTS.

Chas. G. Dawes Visits Wall Street and Promises Republican Party Will Be Good.

Under New York date line of Sept. 19 the daily papers of the country publish a dispatch from which the following is taken:

"The visit of Charles G. Dawes, of Chicago (formerly Comptroller of the Currency), had more influence than anything else in arousing Wall street uneasiness. Mr. Dawes came to New York primarily to raise money for the Republican congressional campaign committee, and he gave the people he called upon very clearly to understand that the Republican majority in the house is in danger."

"Wall street has steeled itself against the importunities of political canvassers for funds, but Mr. Dawes' visit was unquestionably impressive. The people who saw and heard him were convinced that he really meant what he said when he announced that unless means were taken to arrest the current and change the situation the Democrats would swing into control of the popular branch of congress and probably elect a president. Mr. Dawes did not confine his visit alone to bankers and financiers. He devoted a good share of his attention to leading representatives of the manufacturing interests. He carried away some money, but not nearly as much as he had hoped for."

SECURING BANK DEPOSITS

Facts For the Consideration of Both Bankers and Depositors.

There is one fact about bank deposits that should have special consideration, namely: Every bank that receives deposits from the United States Treasury or from any treasury, under the late depository law recognizes two classes of customers. The above-named are preferred creditors, while all others are common and second-class depositors. The former has his deposit guaranteed by a counter-deposit of interest-bearing bonds, while the latter has no security whatever. The bonds to secure him are bought by the common depositors' money, therefore in the event of failure, the preferred creditors are paid first, while the common claimant pays the expenses of a receivership and after months or years of delay, takes what is left of the defunct bank. The first party has in effect a gilt-edge first mortgage, while the second has not a scratch of a pen except a certificate of deposit. These are the facts which neither Hughes, Taft, Roosevelt, Cannon nor any of their campaigners ever state correctly. They dodge this question, they dare not go against the facts. It is a condition of favoritism in business that is indefensible. Only a few years ago the customers of banks were on the same level. They were all treated alike, yet now it is different, some are insured and some are not.
