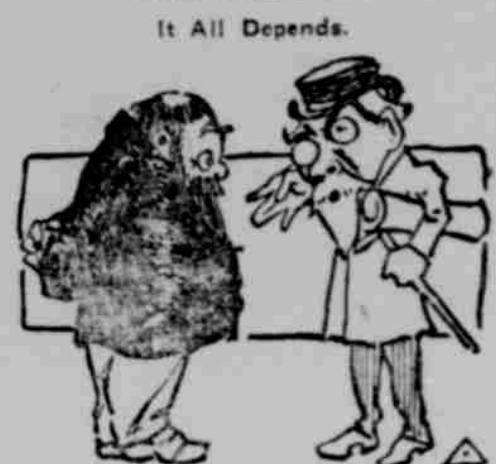
Boone Township Trustee's Notice.


